

Sawyer Lists Suggestions for Changes in Capitol Zone, Plans Conflict with City Council Action

Seven recommendations for Salem and seven for the state for developing the capitol area are made in a preliminary report submitted to members of the capitol planning commission by Robert W. Sawyer, chairman of the group.

The commission, created by the 1949 legislature as an advisory body, will meet soon to study the preliminary plans and possibly make recommendations. Should the recommendations become effective as they are, new legislation by the city council and some rescinding of previous council action would be necessary. Portions of the Baldock plan would have to be reconsidered.

The recommendations would bring into the capitol zone district the area surrounding the proposed extended capitol grounds. The capitol grounds would include the area from 13th street to High street between State and Court and from Court street to D street between Capitol and Winter.

Purchasing Land
West of Summer street between Center and Chemeketa, the state is purchasing the land for future building. The recommendations would relocate Summer street by closing it between Chemeketa and Center, and extending East and West Summer through to Center street. Under the plan Chemeketa street would be closed between Capitol and Winter. This would require alteration of the Baldock plan which utilizes Chemeketa in the one-way grid.

The plan calls for the extension of the mall when property purchases have been completed by the board of control. The commission recommends that the second block of the mall be extended to cross streets.

Street Closure
Closure of Chemeketa under the plans would permit use of the block between Summer and Capitol as a parking area for the new state office building and the proposed highway commission building with entrance only via Capitol street.

For further easement of parking situation in the capitol zone, the commission plans development of Waverly street for a parking area for the original state office building, supreme court and capitol building. This would require vacation of Waverly by the city. Extension of the mall to Marion street is considered by the plan affecting added changes to the Baldock plan which would utilize Summer street in that area for southbound traffic from Fairgrounds road to Chemeketa street. Summer street would be eliminated from the traffic grid scheduled.

Appeal Filed in Tokyo Rose Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Attorneys for Mrs. Iva Toguri d'Aquino today filed an appeal from her conviction in the Tokyo Rose treason case.

The 33-year old woman, born in Los Angeles, was sentenced yesterday to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine for treasonable broadcasts from Tokyo during wartime.

The appeal was filed in ninth federal circuit court of appeals.

Oil 'Gusher' In Washington Just Rumor

OCEAN CITY, Wash., Oct. 7.—(AP)—They had a burst of excitement and a burst of gas pressure mud at the Union Oil company test well here last night, but no oil strike. Officials said it was just a case of the equipment springing a leak.

The furor of the pop-off resulted in reports as distant as Tacoma that the well had come in as an oil producer. It resulted in rumors running wild around the adjacent Grays Harbor area.

Al Hilton, petroleum engineer for the company, said the leak allowed gas and mud to blow wild into the air. He criticized persons who spread the oil reports after seeing the blow-off.

Hilton said the gas came from two sources: the discharge from "gushers" used to perforate the well casing and the natural gas accumulating in the well.

Operations were proceeding between the 3670 and 4400 foot levels when the incident occurred. The blow interrupted testing operations for about an hour.

Hilton described the blow as "a spectacular sight," adding: "We don't know if we've got anything or not. We are now continuing normal testing operations, pumping muddy, gas water from the 1300-foot level in the upper zone."

Talks to Start In Rail Strike

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7.—(AP)—An agreement was reached late today on a plan for settling the four-week-old Missouri Pacific strike. It won't bring an immediate end to the crippling strike, but Gov. Forrest Smith of Missouri said "unless some unforeseen obstacle arises, the trains should be running in a week's time."

The plan was produced at a conference of governors or their representatives from eight states affected by the walkout. It calls for both sides to enter immediate negotiations "in good faith" on the 282 union claims that led to the strike.

WRECK VICTIM BETTER

3 GIs Return From Red Zone Under Guard

VIENNA, Austria, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Three American soldiers who have spent the last five months in the Soviet zone of Austria — "of their own free wills," the Russians say — hiked back into the U. S. zone under guard today, clean-shaven and in full uniforms.

A witness to the transfer said they appeared relieved to be back. The GIs were Pvt. Peter Pontillo, 34, of Cleveland; Recruit Carl Ruhnke, 30, of Miami, Ariz., and Recruit Carl Pruester, 30, of Newark, N. J.

A U. S. army spokesman, reporting the army is examining absence without leave charges in the case, said Pontillo was suffering from malaria and insect bites, apparently by bedbugs, and Pruester, who had lost 10 pounds, had scabbies (the itch).

Lt. Gen. V. P. Sviridov, the Russian high commissioner, told a four-power allied council meeting last Friday that the three were tourists.

"The men are not being detained," he said. U. S. army authorities questioned the three at length, but no details of their experiences were made public.

They were taken to an army hospital for examination. The hospital reported there was no sign any of them was suffering from malnutrition and quoted the men as saying that their food was "adequate."

Added Polio Case Found

An additional poliomyelitis case, not considered severe, was in Salem Memorial hospital Friday. The three persons already under treatment for the disease "all seem to be past the acute stage," according to a special polio consulting physician.

Dale Esch, 23, of 253 Gerth ave., West Salem, was admitted to the hospital Friday morning with involvement of one leg. He was reported in "fair" condition by hospital attendants, but his physician refused to yield any information on the case.

Howard Unruh Judged Insane

CAMDEN, N. J., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Mass killer Howard B. Unruh is insane, Prosecutor Mitchell H. Cohen announced today. Under New Jersey law, the prosecutor said, he will move next week to commit the 28-year-old war veteran to an institution for the criminally insane.

He will not be brought to trial on any of the 13 indictments charging him with murder. One month ago yesterday, Unruh shot and killed 13 persons in the bloodiest street slaughter in U. S. History.

Villanova Rally Downs St. Mary's

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Villanova college struck from behind for its fourth straight football victory tonight, defeating St. Mary's 28-20 after the Galloping Geels of California had converted three bobbles into touchdowns within five minutes in the second period. A crowd of 14,632 saw Villanova remain among the nation's unbeaten eleven.

DRIVER HELD IN JAIL

Dallas Reservoir Near Completion

DALLAS, Oct. 7.—(Special)—Dallas' new 3,000,000-gallon reservoir will be completed in November, barring delays, according to E. L. McCleary, water commission manager. The final concrete work is expected to be finished by October 20.

Heavy rains have slowed the project considerably over the past few days, particularly in the pouring of slopes. The city's pumping station, meanwhile, has been running around the clock to supply present needs through the old reservoir.

Two weeks of steady rain should increase the creek's flow sufficiently to stop the pumps, McCleary reported.

Man Tumbles From Traintop

A tumble from the top of a moving train near the SP yard office caused painful but not serious head injuries and bruises to Edward Barrett, 4886 Rickman rd., early Friday morning, city police and first aid men reported.

Barrett, a railroad worker, was walking along the top of a slow-moving train near 14th and Hines streets and attempted to step from one car to another when he slipped and fell over the right side. In falling he struck against the side of the moving car and against a standing car.

Garrett suffered a two-inch cut on the back of his head and multiple sprains and abrasions. He was not hospitalized.

Bill Includes Appropriation For Polk Road

DALLAS, Oct. 7.—(Special)—The U. S. senate has approved house resolution 6008, which includes an appropriation for the Polk county road claim in the Camp Adair area.

The money will compensate the county for damages done to roads in the area by military vehicles during World War II. The bill, recently passed by the house, now goes to conference, according to word received from Walter Norblad, representative from Oregon's first congressional district. The amount allowed for the Polk claim is \$104,060, which should be forthcoming soon after agreement is reached in conference.

Ching Lectures Coal Disputants

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Federal Conciliation Director Cyrus S. Ching lectured John L. Lewis and the soft coal operators today on the seriousness of their 19-day-old strike.

"This dispute must be settled promptly," Ching said in a statement. Ching told a news conference however at the end of a full day of talks with both sides that he had not given them any kind of ultimatum to settle, nor had he placed a time limit on the negotiation of a contract to supplant the one which expired last June 30.

6 Electrocuted by Wire in Flooded Yard

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Oct. 7.—(AP)—An iron rod hit a high-tension wire in a flooded yard today, struck down Mrs. Isoldina Martine and set off a death chain in which five more women were electrocuted in succession as they tried to save her.

Three of the women were daughters of Mrs. Martine. One was her sister.

Late Sports Bucks Defeat Rangers, 7-6

AUMSVILLE, Oct. 7.—(Special)—A successful extra-point try after a second quarter touchdown today gave St. Paul's Buckaroos a 7-6 win over Aumsville's Rangers and the lead in the Marion County B league grid race. Both teams were unbeaten up to the clash.

A long pass from Marv Rasmussen to Paul Kirk and an ensuing 20-yard dash gave the Bucks their six points and Larry Rasmussen plunged for the deciding point.

The Rangers scored in the fourth period on an aerial from Orville Speer to Darrell Dalke. Speer's attempted run for point failed.

Indians Subdue Sublimity 7-6

CHEMOWA, Oct. 7.—(Special)—The favored Chemawa Indians snared a slim 7-6 victory over Sublimity today in a Marion County B league fray.

Dick Thorpe's three-yard buck supplied the Indians with six points in the third quarter and culminated a 70-yard drive. Louis Beigard plunged for the extra point which provided the margin. Ed Highberger tallied for the "Subs" in the second chapter when he gobbled up an enemy fumble and raced 76 yards to pay dirt.

Gervais Spanks Turner, 20 to 0

TURNER, Oct. 7.—(Special)—The Gervais Cougars packed too much strength for the Turner Tigers today in their Marion County B league football game and went home with a 20-0 victory. Pat Mahoney tallied the first touchdown in the second period and Jim Toolie added the point. It wasn't until the final quarter that the winners scored again, then with Doug Hall and Earl Belleque going over, and Toolie adding another conversion point.

Jefferson Tops Mill City 13-12

MILL CITY, Oct. 7.—(Special)—Mill City's Timberwolves went down 13-12 to Jefferson's Lions today in their Marion County B league football clash here. Jim Grimes smashed over both Jefferson touchdowns and flipped a pass to an end for the conversion point after the opening score. The margin of victory, Leo Poole and Bob Baltimore tallied the TD's for the Timberwolves, but their two placement tries failed.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The trend switched toward the Ohio State grid camp today and the Buckeyes from the big ten probably will take the field tomorrow favored to trim the Trojans of Southern California.

Senate Rejects 90% of Parity Price Supports

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The senate turned down mandatory 90 per cent of parity price supports for basic farm commodities tonight.

By a vote of 45 to 26 it reversed the decision of last Tuesday that snarled up, price support legislation and sent it back to committee for a new start.

Then it pressed on toward a vote on the measure by Senator Anderson (D-NM), former secretary of agriculture, for so-called "flexible" supports of 75 to 90 per cent of parity. It recessed until Monday without completing action on the measure.

Canton Defense Ring Slipping

CANTON, China, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The military situation north of Canton went from bad to worse for the nationalists today.

There were indications the National defense ministry planned to transfer to Chungking within a matter of days, although official confirmation was lacking.
