Sectional Tourney Slated

Salem's first sectional tournament as a part of the American Contract Bridge league will be held the week end of October 29-30. It was announced today by W. E. Kimsey, chairman of Salem Elks B. club sponsoring the meet.

Between 100 and 150 top duplicate players from all parts of the northwest are expected to attend the two-day session. Two championship events for open pairs and mixed pairs are scheduled, while single session tournaments will be held Saturday afternoon and evening, and Sunday afternoon. Invitations are being sent ACBL clubs in Portland, Seattle, Spokane, Seaside, Redmond, Eugene, Corvallis, Medford and other cities.

Arrangements for the tournament are being worked out by a special committee headed by Arthur L. Lewis and including Mrs. Arthur Binegar, Mrs. Walter M. Cline, William F. Leary and Ellis H. Jones, director. All sessions will be held at the chamber of commerce rooms. A midnight lunch will be served at the "crying room" Saturday following the evening play.

Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Johnson of Portland will be director and head scorer, respectively, while a protest committee will be headed by Max Manchester of Portland, former president of the bridge league. Trophies and master points will be awarded to the winners.

The local organization has been holding weekly tournaments at the Elks club for more than a year. Several special events also have been held, and Salem players have been winning honors at meets in other cities.

At the October master point play this week, winners were Mrs. Paul F. Burris and Mrs. Charles Foulger (east-west) and Miss Jose Moritz and Ray Jenkins (north-south). The second in a new series of weekly tournaments will be held Monday evening at the Elks club.
