Baby Clinic Set Tuesday At Woodburn

WOODBURN — A well-baby conference will be held Tuesday, October 11, at the Woodburn library from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. with Dr. W. J. Stone in charge. Mrs. John Hooper, local health committee chairman, announces that appointments may be obtained by calling Woodburn 1602.

This is the first of a series of child health conferences for north Marion county to be held each month. The first conference for first graders at the local schools will be held the same day, Tuesday, from 9 a.m. until noon. Parents will receive a notice and appointment time for their first-grade children. Each youngster who is given an appointment for the health examination should be accompanied by a parent or by some representative of the parent. The examinations are planned to give the child education experience, to inform the parents of the health status of their child, and to determine fitness to carry school responsibilities.

Local women will assist Dr. Stone in the well-baby clinic at the library. The conferences are designed to show mothers how to keep well babies well and to encourage the maximum growth and normal development.

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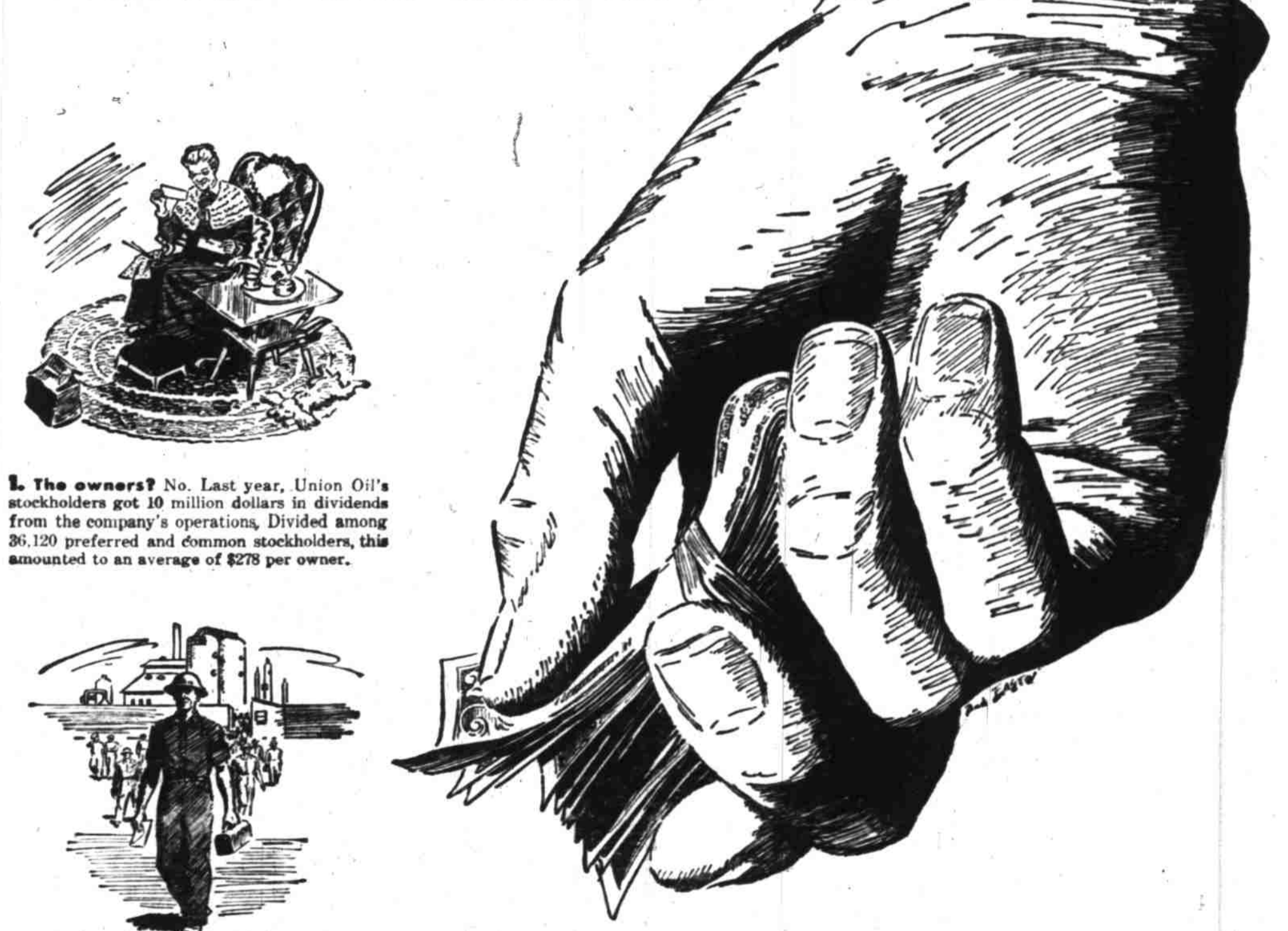
