

16 Ordinances Win Approval Of City Council

(Council news also on page 1)
The Salem city council Monday night passed 16 ordinances, including two zone changes and a spur track franchise.
The spur will be placed by Oregon Electric railway on North Front street to serve the new Wallace Bonesteel warehouse.
A special business zone was voted for a downtown Court street lot, to enable Attorney Donald A. Young to erect a law office building. Residential zoning was changed from class I to class II to permit erection of a duplex on one lot at 13th and Rural streets.
Another bill altered a setback line to allow Walter Nelson to enclose a porch on his home at Wilber and South Capitol streets. The city taxicab ordinance was amended to make license fees payable a year at a time. The city treasurer was authorized to borrow \$240,000 for city use pending receipt of tax monies. Ten bills

City Engineer J. H. Davis reported that a program of sidewalk construction will be underway this month.
A memorial resolution was adopted on the death of William H. Crawford who had served as the city's judge pro tem.
John A. Murray notified the council that a group of North Summer street petitioners (owning property between Belmont and E streets) wished to withdraw an earlier request for business zoning. His letter noted that the new state capital planning commission had moved "to readjust action of the Salem city council dedicating North Summer street to the state of Oregon for highway purposes."

Bargain Night, But Council 'Only Looking'

It was bargain night Monday for Salem city council.
Aldermen had a 20-minute sales talk and demonstration of the "latest model" parking meter, plus an offer to "pick up" for shipping charges only, an F63 (King Cobra) army fighter plane.
The plane would have to be used as a war memorial, grounded, and would cost about \$1,000, the council was informed by Oregon Adjutant General Thomas E. Rilea who'd had word from the air material command.
The parking meters (Miller brand with new trade name Automaton) was shown by Salesman James Groves to be complete with lucite dome top ("more visibility"), enlarged coin box, slugging "push button" coin slot, trouble flag to warn of jammed mechanism and 1- or 2-hour reversible time plates.
But, in both instances, the aldermen were "only looking."

Robert Sharp, 19, of 1308 Pearl st., incurred facial cuts and shock when the panel delivery truck he operated collided with a car at Church and Belmont streets at 12:10 p.m. The other driver, George M. Gottfried, 23, of 1280 N. 4th st., also was treated for cuts by first aid men.
Police said the frame of the Gottfried car was bent into a U shape by the crash.

Man Burns to Death Near Sweet Home

SWEET HOME, Oct. 10—(Special)—Paul Johnson, 31, was burned to death Sunday night when he was trapped in a fire that destroyed the Rex Rogers home on Ames creek, a mile east of Sweet Home.
Glenn Huston, Linn county coroner, said Johnson, who had been living with Rogers, apparently was asleep when the fire started and was overcome by smoke and flames.
Firefighters did not discover his body until the blaze was extinguished.
The fire, of undetermined origin, was discovered by Rogers when he returned from a movie in Lebanon. Equipment was summoned immediately but the fire was out of control when engines arrived. The loss, partly covered by insurance, was estimated at \$2,000.
Johnson was an employee of the Willamette National Lumber company at Foster and has lived here the past two years. He was born in Portland Nov. 4, 1927.
Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde W. Johnson, Coos Bay; a brother, Clyde Walter, Jr., who is in the Sweet Home city hospital; and a sister, Mrs. Erma Jean Alstatt, Portland.

Delay Granted In Hiss Trial Until November

NEW YORK, Oct. 10—(P)—Decision was reserved today on an application by Alger Hiss, former high state department official, to transfer his second perjury trial to Vermont.
An adjournment until Nov. 1 was granted to permit Hiss' new counsel to familiarize himself with the case.
Claude B. Cross, Boston attorney engaged by Hiss to replace Lloyd Paul Stryker, who defended Hiss at his first trial, asked for an adjournment of two months.
Assistant U. S. Attorney Thomas F. Murphy, who prosecuted Hiss at the first trial, argued that the request was unreasonable.
Judge Leibell fixed Nov. 1 as the trial date.
Hiss is accused of lying in denying he transmitted secret state department documents to Whittaker Chambers, an admitted former communist courier. Chambers is a former senior editor of Time magazine.

Gale Crosses Oregon Coast

SEATTLE, Oct. 10—(P)—An Alaska-born gale hit the Oregon and Washington coast tonight and moved inland, bearing heavy rain for the lowlands and snow for higher elevations of the Cascade mountains.
The weather bureau said the storm, covering a wide front from the northern tip of Washington into Oregon, blew in winds of 50 miles an hour at the entrance to the strait of Juan De Fuca and 35 miles an hour at the mouth of the Columbia river.
Forecasters said western sections of both states will have rain-soaked gusts up to 40 miles an hour during the night and early tomorrow. The rain is expected to change to snow in Washington and North-central Oregon transmountain passes during the day Tuesday, abating by nightfall.

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2 Endurance Fliers Land After 47 Days in Air; Welcome Waits

YUMA, Ariz., Oct. 10—(P)—Pilots Woody Jongeward and Bob Woodhouse brought their faltering "City of Yuma" in to a perfect landing today after setting a new world endurance mark of 46 days, 20 hours and 18 minutes.
Sheriff's deputies estimated the crowd which greeted the fliers at more than 15,000. The Arizona national guard furnished an honor guard for the aviators as they walked unassisted from their plane to an automobile and from the automobile to the platform where they were received by Mayor W. J. Anderson.

Supreme Court Denies Plea of Andrew May

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10—(P)—Andrew J. May, wartime chairman of the house military affairs committee, has refused a supreme court review of his conviction on conspiracy and bribery charges today.
Attorneys for the 74-year-old May had contended that if his sentence of eight or 24 months in prison were carried out it would result in "the destruction of a fine public servant of stainless reputation (and) it may further result in his death."
The court also turned down pleas by Texas and Louisiana for dismissal of a suit in which the federal government seeks to establish its control over oil-rich submerged lands off their coasts.
The justice department is seeking a ruling similar to that which the court handed down in the case of California—that the federal government has paramount rights over the so-called tidelands.
In two brief orders the court gave Texas and Louisiana an additional 30 days in which to reply to the government suit. It will then decide the next step, which might be argument of the case or the appointment of a special master to hear testimony and make a recommendation.
After the formal session at which it disposed of these and other cases, the court listened to arguments on the validity of the communist oath requirement of the Taft-Hartley labor law.

Tokyo Rose Denied Bail

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10—(P)—Bail was denied Mrs. Iva Toguri D'Aquino today pending action on her appeal from a treason conviction.
She was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine last week for making the "Tokyo Rose" propaganda broadcasts for Japan during World War II.
Prosecutor Tom DeWolfe, arguing against granting bail to the Los Angeles born woman, told Federal Judge Michael J. Roche: "The government has had a sad experience recently—the case of Gerhard Eisler."
Eisler, a communist agent convicted of contempt of congress, slipped out of the United States while on bail awaiting a decision on his appeal.
