Marble Staging a Comeback in All Kinds of New Furniture

If your mental picture of marble in furniture is the tops of Victorian tables and dressers, it's time for revision. Marble is one of the beautiful and practical materials now being incorporated in many kinds of new furniture, particularly that of the classic modern school. One of the country's designer-manufacturers of really fine furniture now has in better furniture departments and stores a round cocktail table with a top of very rich, dark marble set into a wood frame. Marble now is being teamed with the better grades of wrought iron furniture, in designs and quality suited for use in your living or dining room as well as porch or terrace. It also

is particularly effective when used as inset tops of desks that are as beautiful in a large living room, study or library as in a well appointed office. In all, about a score of leading furniture manufacturers are using marble, principally in occasional and dining tables, and in bureaus and for the bedroom. This use adds a rich beauty with a new standard of service, for marble is one of the most nearly indestructible materials. It's proof against all the ordinary household stains. Moreover it's easily kept sparkling clean by washing with soap and water, wiping with clear water, and drying. In time the glowing polish will become household abrasive, such as silver polish, will generally bring back the lovely glow. The marble widely used and one that is particularly attractive in both color and an especially fine pattern that harmonizes well with the hardwoods used in furniture is Carrara marble. 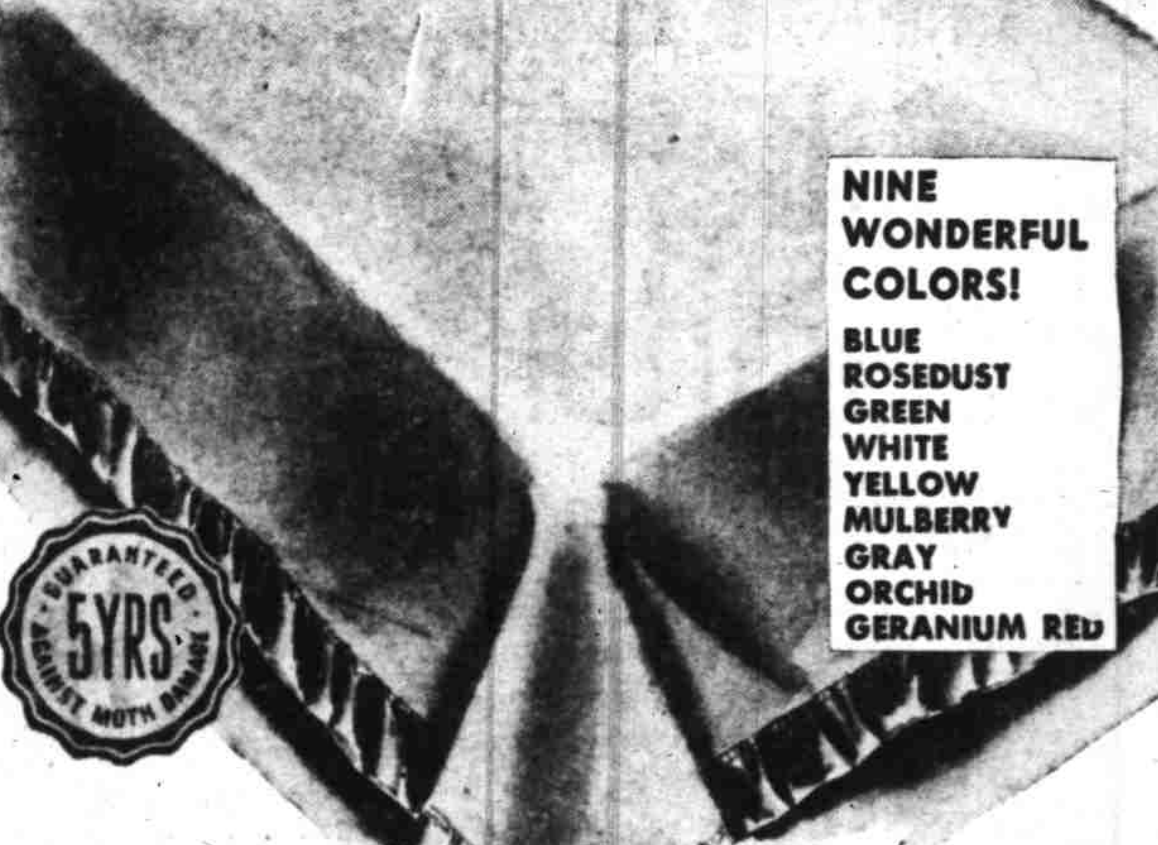
