British Chiefs Confer Over Defense Costs

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Britain's top leaders said the king, the opposition and some United States senators today about defense, which has got in the way of the government's economy drive.

Prime Minister Attlee talked with King George VI at Buckingham palace in the afternoon. He met a group of conservatives, headed by Winston Churchill and Anthony Eden, in his room at the house of commons tonight.

Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin conferred with four visiting members of a U.S. senate appropriations subcommittee. They were believed to have talked about Britain's share of the \$1,310,010,000 military aid program voted by congress.

No announcement was made as to what ground was covered.

The subcommittee members, on a world tour to see how American defense money is spent, are Senator Ellender (D-La.), Green (D-R.I.), Ferguson (R-Mich.) and Jenner (R-Ind.).

Attlee presumably told the king just how much worse things will get in austere Britain before they get better.

Attlee will unveil his new economy plan Monday.

Monday night the prime minister will take to the radio. He will explain what the labor government's cuts will mean to the living standards of about 50,000,000 Britons.

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Rat-Proofing Plans Set by Health Service

A program of rat-proofing to be carried out in Marion county by the U.S. public health service early next year has been announced by the county health department.

Officials said the program to continue four or five months, would stress preventative measures and would involve only a small amount of actual baiting.

In other news from the health department's monthly executive committee meeting, it was revealed that births in 1949 continue to show an increase and deaths a decrease over the same period last year.

September births totaled 210, including 95 boys and 115 girls and brought the year's total to 1830, compared with 1,752 in 1948.

The 75 September deaths included 41 men and 34 women for a year's total of 590, compared with 606 for this far in 1948. There were two infant deaths in September, both under one month.

Heart disease, with 14, continued to lead as a cause of death, followed by cancer 10, apoplexy 6, kidney disease 5. Communicable diseases which proved fatal were

Hodgkin's disease 1, poliomyelitis 2 and tuberculosis 1.

Among new cases of communicable disease reported were 21 of enteritis, making the total 123, compared to last year's 4; impetigo, 15, more than last year's 1; total to date of 8, and bringing 1949's to 49; dysentery 14, chickenpox 17.

Tarzan's Mate Wins Divorce

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Oct. 20 (AP)—The real life mate of the film Tarzan, Lex Barker, divorced him October 11, it was disclosed today. He is the 10th actor to play the handsome jungle man role.

Mrs. Constance J. Barker, formerly of New York, obtained the decree by default, alleging that he had caused her grievous physical and mental suffering. Granting the decree apparently passed unnoticed because it was in the actor's real name, Alexander Crichtlow Barker, jr.

The couple, married in 1942, has two small children.

Alaskan Accepts Silverton Lutheran Church Pastor
