Farm Ponds Survey Made

SILVERTON—During the past week preliminary engineering surveys have been made by the Silver Creek soil conservation district's engineer, Wallace Dawson, on the farms of Delph Heater, Virgil Tschantz, Victor Hadley and L. B. Movus.

These surveys are investigations as to feasible sites for the construction of ponds. If the dam seems feasible a detailed survey will be made so that when the land owner is ready to start construction, he will know the amount of fill he will have to put in the dam and estimate of concrete needed for the core wall and cut-off collars.

More surveys will be made in the near future, local soil conservation officials state.
