1. Tournament open only to persons under 18 years of age residing in the following counties: Marion, Benton, Polk, Yamhill, Clackamas and Linn.
2. Fish must be played on rod, reel, and line by one person only.
3. Fish must be taken during legal open season and during legal angling hours.
4. Fish may be taken from any of Oregon's winter steelhead streams.
5. Tournament open from November 1, 1949, through February 28, 1950.
6. Two adults must witness weighing and measuring of fish and sign entry blank.
7. Entry blank must be filled in completely, using separate blank for each fish.
8. Extra blanks are obtainable free at The Statesman office.
9. There is no entry fee.
10. Please don't bring in the fish.

Awards

Tournament awards for the five largest steelhead entered during the tournament.

1st prize: Complete spinning outfit consisting of spinning rod, reel, line and lures.
2nd prize: Pair hip length rubber angling boots.
3rd prize: Metal tackle box.
4th prize: Custom built landing net.
5th prize: Special folding gaff hook.

In addition to the five grand prizes there will be smaller weekly prizes for the largest fish entered during each week of the tournament. Prizes to be announced each week.
