Courthouse Board to Act On Final Plans

Marion county courthouse building commission will meet Tuesday at 7 p.m. in the courthouse to consider final approval for exterior plans of the proposed new county courthouse.

County Clerk Harlan Judd said that Pietro Belluschi, Portland architect, will not be present. Interior plans of the proposed new building have been approved in general by the commission.

As soon as all plans are checked by the commission Belluschi will be directed to draw up a complete set of working plans for contractors to bid on. The new building is to cost about \$1,500,000 and is to occupy the site of the present structure.

Members of the building commission include County Judge Grant Murphy and Commissioners E. L. Rogers and Roy Rice, and Charles A. Sprague, Karl Steiwer and Ray J. Glatt. Judd is secretary to the commission.



Egg prices in Salem dropped from one to three cents a dozen Saturday, marking the second cut since the market reached its price peak about a month ago.

Wholesale houses were buying extra large AAs for 84 cents a dozen; large AAs, 82 cents; large As, 80 cents; medium AAs, 82 cents; medium As, 80 cents, and pullets, 38 cents. Retail prices range from 8 to 10-cents a dozen higher.




