

Shotguns Protect Barge Unloaders

THE DALLES, Oct. 27-(P)-A 22-man crew of cowhands and farm workers unloaded 40 tons of Hawaiian pineapple from a barge here today under the watchful eyes of more than a dozen sheriff's deputies armed with shotguns.

The work proceeded slowly, but without incident, in sharp contrast to the previous attempt at unloading last September 28 when 200 men stormed the dock, injuring two truck drivers and smashing equipment.

Unloading began this morning after four CIO longshore pickets departed when a restraining order, granted yesterday by Circuit Judge Malcolm W. Wilkinson, was served on them.

The pineapple, barged here during the Hawaiian longshore

strike, was being put aboard rail cars as fast as it was unloaded for shipment to a San Jose, Calif., cannery.

A spokesman for the dock commission, doing the unloading under contract with Isleways, Ltd., owner of the cargo, expressed hope that work could be speeded up to a rate of 1000 cases a day. It may take 10 days to complete unloading, however, he added.

Whether the work would continue beyond Monday depended on a hearing scheduled on the temporary restraining order issued by Judge Wilkinson.

At that time the IO longshoremen have been ordered to show cause why an injunction against further picketing should not be issued.

Truman Simply Refuses to Be Embarrassed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27-(P)-President Truman coined a new description of himself today—embarrass-proof.

He told a news conference that everybody in the world had tried to embarrass him and it hadn't worked.

The subject came up when a reporter asked Mr. Truman if he planned to campaign for Rep. Leonard Irving (D-Mo) who is up for re-election in the president's home district next year.

Mr. Truman replied that he would cross that bridge when he got to it.

Irving, a freshman congressman, has been in the headlines several times lately.

First, last summer, as the result of a suit filed demanding an accounting of funds belonging to local 264 of the hod carriers union (AFL) which Irving heads. That suit was dismissed. A later union meeting he addressed broke up in a fight.

This week members of Irving's office staff here were quoted as saying they had been locked out. Irving was quoted as saying that the publicity about this incident was stirred up by enemies seeking to embarrass him as well as the president.

Informing Mr. Truman's remarks, Irving told a reporter that as far as he knows the president did not campaign for him last year and that he had not expected such help in 1950.

"I have stood on my own feet and I intend to stand on my own feet at all times," he said, although he emphasized that he "likes the president fine."

Marcantonio Denies Charge

NEW YORK, Oct. 27-(P)-President Joseph P. Ryan of the AFL longshoremen said today that Rep. Vito Marcantonio (Alp-NY) is plotting a citywide dock strike tomorrow.

Marcantonio, running for mayor of New York on the American labor party ticket, replied that "I know of no strike."

"Ryan is connected with the O'Dwyer campaign and this is just a dirty gimmick," added Marcantonio.

Mayor William O'Dwyer, a democrat, is running for reelection against Marcantonio and Republican Newbold Morris.

Blaze Starts In Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif., Oct. 27-(P)-Firemen battled a smoldering blaze in the Rose bowl from 11:30 o'clock last night until 7:30 o'clock this morning before getting it under control.

The fire was started from cigarette butts dropped during last night's Marines-Navy football game. Spectators complained during the game of having "hot feet." The flames were burning wooden supports in the concrete structure at that time. Firemen had to drill through concrete in 12 different places in tunnel three before quelling the fire.

Firemen said cigarettes were dropped through cracks in the wooden seats.

CHUNGKING, China, Oct. 27-(P)-The Chinese nationalists announced today they had killed 20,000 and captured 4,000 communist troops who invaded Chinmen island, just east of red-captured Amoy.

Czechs Expel Frenchmen For 'Uranium Spying'

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 27-(P)-In a growing attack on western diplomats, Czechoslovakia today expelled two members of the French embassy on charges of trying to spy out the nation's uranium mining secrets. Another Frenchman was arrested.

Most of Czechoslovakia's mines are reported operated under the direction of Soviet Russia and mostly for Russian benefit.

Archbishop Complains of Mexico Policy

YORK, Eng., Oct. 27-(P)-The Archbishop of York wrote today that Mexico denied him the freedom of attire he was permitted even in Russia.

The Right Rev. Cyril Foster Garbett reported in a diocesan letter that on his recent trip to North America he had intended visiting Mexico. But, he said, he was told he wouldn't be allowed there unless he dressed as a layman in keeping with Mexican law. He cancelled his visit.

"In Moscow," he said, "I had walked through the streets wearing my cassock and cross, but in Mexico apparently this stage of religious toleration has not been reached."
