

4 Truckloads Of Pineapple Leave Docks

THE DALES Ore., Oct. 28—(P)—Four truckloads of Hawaiian pineapple left here today, but the railroad brotherhoods stymied an attempt to ship a much larger quantity of the fruit by rail.

Four Portland-Pendleton motor transport company trucks took 80 tons of pineapple toward the San Jose, Calif., cannery to which the fruit is consigned.

But the railroaders, who refused to cross a CIO picket line here last week, declined to move five loaded boxcars, despite the fact that there were no pickets out. The boxcars held 250 tons.

T. J. Carson, chairman of the brotherhood grievance committee, said the reason was that some railroaders contend there have been made against them. One worker said a rock was thrown at his door.

Carson and other brotherhood officials posted a notice in the freight yard office, advising railroaders to bring no more cars to the dock.

Only a small part of the cargo has been unloaded by the cowboys and farmhands who have been working for two days, ever since the court issued a restraining order preventing picketing. More than 2,300 of the 2,700 tons of pineapple are still aboard.

Engel Claims Twin Brother Did Wooing

CHICAGO, Oct. 28 —(P)—The first week of the criminal court production of "I Married an Angel" ended abruptly today after four widows testified Sigmund Engel was their husband.

The trial of Engel on a charge of running a confidence game was recessed until Monday after Prosecutor James A. Brown said his last witness, whom he did not identify, had not arrived from Minneapolis.

The wispy-haired, 74-year-old Engel then claimed his "only real wife," Mrs. Pauline Langton Engel, from the spectators' benches and led her away. He is at liberty under bond.

Earlier, the blonde-ringed 39-year-old widow from New York had giggled, hidden her face from photographers, then suddenly posed for them while pirouetting on tiptoe.

As court adjourned, Engel kissed her gloved hand, murmuring "come honey, baby darling."

"No, it's buttercup," she cooed. Engel told newsmen he will have 25 character witnesses when his defense opens next week. In addition, he says, Arthur will be there. Arthur is the twin brother Sam blames for all his troubles. The prosecution claims Arthur is a myth.

"I'm going to produce Arthur. I said it, and that means it is affirmed."

The state alleges Engel reaped several thousand dollars by marrying or proposing to marry, well-to-do widows and divorcees, then disappearing with their money, jewels or other assets, some of which he made certain to liquidate in advance.

Father Feeney Released from Jesuit Order

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 28 —(P)—The Rev. Leonard J. Feeney, S.J., central figure of a six-month-old public dispute with Catholic Archbishop Richard J. Cushing, was dismissed tonight from the Jesuit order.

Fr. Feeney himself announced the dismissal and said it was "for disobedience."

The noted Jesuit author, poet and lecturer — deprived of his priestly functions by Archbishop Cushing since January 1 — summoned reporters to St. Benedict's center to tell the latest development in his argument with the hierarchy.

The dispute arose over the contention of a group led by Father Feeney that there is no salvation for persons outside the Catholic church. Late in July the supreme sacred congregation of the holy office in Rome declared that this view was "far from being genuine Catholic teaching."

Gym Program At Mt. Angel Starts Monday

MT. ANGEL — Beginning Monday, October 31, seven service organizations of the community will take over the supervision of St. Mary's gym, a regular schedule assigning a day to each club.

On week days the gym will be open from 6:30 to 10 p.m.; Saturdays from 2 to 5 p.m. and again from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m., and on Sundays from 2 to 5 p.m. only.

The weekly schedule is as follows: Mondays, Mt. Angel Legion post 89; Tuesdays, Catholic Daughters of America; Wednesdays, Catholic Order of Foresters; Thursdays, Knights of Columbus; Fridays, Business Men's club; Saturday afternoon and night, Young People's sodality; and Sunday afternoons, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Tuesday night is set aside for girls only, and Sunday night is the only night of the week when the gym will not be open.

Under the present program every youngster in the community is welcome to come to the gym and take part in the activities and use all the facilities available without charge. The only requirements are that those wishing to get out on the floor must wear tennis shoes and obey those in charge.

Later opposing teams will be organized among the local groups and also with out-of-town teams.

Left-Wing CIO Unions Merge As Meet Nears

CLEVELAND, Oct. 28 —(P)—The merger of the CIO's farm equipment workers into the United Electrical workers lent additional ammunition tonight for a slambang right-wing-left wing battle at the CIO convention here next week.

The farm equipment workers' executive board said in Chicago that the merger was approved by an 84 per cent majority, reducing the international union to the status of a division of the left-wing UE.

In merging with the electrical workers, the FE violated a year-old CIO order to join Walter Reuther's right-wing United Auto Workers.

The FE has a membership of about 20,000; the UE about 400,000.

CIO Vice President Allan S. Haywood said the newly announced merger would not be recognized by the CIO and will have no effect on the size of delegations representing either the FE or the UE.

"The jurisdiction belongs to the auto workers," said Haywood.

NLRB Rules Against ITU

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 —(P)—The national labor relations board today unanimously held the AFL International Typographical union guilty of violating the Taft-Hartley act.

The board said the big printers union had set up illegally a "bargaining strategy" which tried to impose closed shop conditions in the newspaper publishing industry.

The board ordered both the ITU and its Chicago local No. 16 not to try to force "discrimination" against employees in violation of the act.

Man Cited After Pedestrian Hit

Indicted by the Polk county grand jury for burglary not in a dwelling are Lucius Charles Fenton, his wife, Lillian Ruth Fenton and Elvin M. Ferrians, all of Bakersfield, Calif.

Bail was set by Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker. The defendants are being held in Polk county jail here. They were arrested by state police in the early morning of October 17 after they set off a burglar alarm in the cafe.

Meier & Frank Firm Involved In NLRB Case

PORTLAND, Oct. 28 —(P)—An unfair labor practices charge, brought by the AFL retail clerks against Meier & Frank Co. department store here, came to light today with the arrival of Time magazine.

The news weekly aroused a furor in press circles by publishing a "was news suppressed?" controversy. It involved a complaint, filed by the clerks with the national labor relations board against Meier & Frank, and accusing the firm of trying to keep them from unionizing.

Monroe Sweetland, writing in the Oregon Democrat, charged that the papers had suppressed news of the NLRB hearing because of Meier & Frank's big advertising business.

The newspapers denied that, saying that the NLRB hearing—held September 6-15—had been overlooked by reporters. At present, the unfair labor practices charge is still awaiting decision.

Brick, Tile Firm Burns at Donald

DONALD, Oct. 28 — Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the Donald Brick and Tile morning at an estimated loss of \$10,000. The loss was covered by insurance.

The two-story building was owned by Joe Fisher of Donald. Woodburn, Aurora and Canby fire departments aided the Donald department in attempting to control the blaze.
