Arrangements are complete for Salem's first sectional contract bridge championships this weekend under auspices of the American Contract Bridge League, it was announced last night by W. E. Kimsey, chairman of the local group, and Arthur L. Lewis, chairman of the special committee.

Duplicate play will start at 1:30 this afternoon in the chamber of commerce rooms with at least 50 top players from Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and other northwest points vying with local representatives for the open pair title and cherry city pairs.

The second session of the open pair play will be held this evening, while others will battle for trophies and master points in the Elks club special. Sunday afternoon will come the final events, mixed pair championship and capital city pairs.

At least three senior masters are expected, while many national and full masters will be on hand. Max Manchester, Harrison Holmes and Arthur Vosburg are top ranking Portland players who are to compete. Sam Gordon and Don Graham, bridge writers, also are expected.

Booklet Helps

Fresh Sandwiches, About Zippers, Homemade Deodorizers Among Ideas

Sometimes the manufacturers get a real constructive idea. It seems to us that putting out a good booklet on household hints, such as a manufacturer of a well known washing machine and mangle has recently done, will win more women to their appliances than all the corny commercials you hear in a whole day.

This booklet, being distributed through the dealers, contains a lot of good ideas, here are some:

Sandwiches to be kept, will remain fresh longer if wrapped in waxed paper and the edges of the paper sealed with a warm iron. Eliminate waste in measuring such liquids as molasses and tomato catsup by greasing the measuring cup slightly first.

Remove veils and fragile trimming from hats before packing them away for the season.

If you get caught in the rain with a good pair of shoes on, rub them with saddle soap before drying (not in direct heat). It will prevent the leather from stiffening.

Zippers should be slid shut before being washed.

Use lukewarm water for sprinkling clothes, it penetrates better than cold.

Here's one that ought to kill all the good booklets has done. When the sub-deb outfits slacks, bring 'em back alive with this trick. Add trouser borders of knitted yarn and sew a matching knitted band around the waist. (Mama could wear them with her best fur coat and green wedgies, might we add)

A little diluted ammonia in a dish allowed to set in a room overnight, will rid the room of the odor of tobacco.

Ammonia is a fine cleanser for flower vases or combs too. Chill candles in the refrigerator for 24 hours to make them burn more evenly and drip less.

A safe way to gather up small pieces of broken glass is to pat them up with dampened absorbent cotton.
