

Ching, Lewis Request Mine Owners Meet

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. —(AP) Federal mediator Cyrus S. Ching held a two-hour parley with John L. Lewis today and then called southern mine owners to meet in Washington on Monday in a drive to end the 47-day-old coal strike.

Coal operators from other sections of the country will be called later, Ching said.

In the steel strike, prospects for an early settlement remained uncertain.

Both Lewis and Ching were silent on details of their long talk behind closed doors at the Statler hotel.

Lewis smoked from the hotel with a half-smoked cigar between his fingers, and when newsmen flocked around him he said: "I have nothing to say."

Ching would not comment on Lewis' reaction to his call for section-by-section conferences.

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with the operators. He said he and Lewis "discussed all the angles."
The federal mediator chief said that in his talks with the operators "we will explore their position, following the same tactics we did in steel, talking to various groups and companies."
"Then we'll go on from there," Ching said. "We'll be talking and pursuing this thing as long as there is any use."

Wreckage of Plane, Body Of Pilot Found

EUGENE, Nov. 4. —(AP) Two hunters yesterday found the body of a flier who disappeared more than two years ago in the rugged Cascade hills.

He was identified by a billfold as Robert L. Rubottom, 24, McMinnville, a former first lieutenant in the air force.

Deputy Sheriff Clair Williams and W. W. Walker came upon the plane wreckage four miles north of Gold Lake.

Sheriff Tom Swarts of Lane county said McChord field officials had been notified and removal of the body was awaiting word from them.

Salem Prices On Eggs Drop

Salem prices on large grade eggs continued to decline Friday, following a similar cut in the Portland wholesale market, but medium and small sizes were up slightly.

Extra large, as listed on the wholesale buying market, were cut two cents from 54 to 52 cents a dozen and large A's from 53 to 51 cents. Medium grades, up one cent with medium A's listed at 41 cents and medium A's at 39. Pullets were boosted from 32 to 35 cents a dozen.

Tuesday's drop was the fourth in the past month. Prices have generally declined 14 cents a dozen since October 4.

White Slavery Charge Filed in Lebanon Case

LEBANON, Nov. 4. — Carl Sturgell, 37, is being held in the city jail here, awaiting extradition to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where he will be tried on white slavery charges. Police Chief Cliff Price revealed today.

Price said Sturgell was arrested by night patrolmen in a rented home after a woman who has been posing as his wife told police he had threatened her life.

Information supplied by the woman, Price stated, led to Sturgell's detention on the white slavery charge. FBI officers uncovered the Idaho charge while questioning Sturgell Thursday and Friday. She has not been arrested.

A search of his billfold by police revealed cards listing his address in several cities throughout the country. He has been employed by a Lebanon implement company recently.

Price said he was withholding the woman's name because she feared other white slavers "would get her for squealing." She is the mother of two small children who are being cared for by Linn county juvenile officers.

Price said the federal warrant in Idaho charges Sturgell with transporting a woman across the state line for immoral purposes.

U.N. Employees Found Dead in Murder-Suicide

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. —(AP) A slashing knife killed a Chinese employee of the United Nations and his attractive woman companion today in a hotel room that followed a decorous evening at the ballet.

Mushana Zolyak, Bulgarian-born translator for the "voice of America," was found nude and stabbed to death on a blood-soaked bed. The shorts-clad body of Wei Huan Kup, 28, lay beside her. It was murder and suicide, said Dr. Nathan Ludwig, assistant medical examiner. He refused to say which was the killer, but pointed out that the 33-year-old brunette was stabbed nine times in the chest and eight times in the back, while Kuo had chest wounds only.

A state department security officer said the woman was married but separated from her husband.

Circuit Judge Kin to Preside over CIO Trial

Chief Justice Hall S. Lusk of the state supreme court Friday assigned Circuit Judge Dahl M. King to preside at the trial of longshoremen charged with rioting when an attempt was made to unload a cargo of Hawaiian pineapples at the Dalles.

Judge King will sit in place of Judge W. W. Wilkinson, Wasco county, who has been disqualified.

Husband Wants Wife Back Despite Plot to Have Him Killed

BREMERTON, Wash., Nov. 4. —(AP) A 31-year-old woman who said she wanted to get rid of her husband because he was too amorous was in jail on an attempted murder charge today.

The husband, denying the reflections on his love-making, said he wanted her back even though the wife signed a statement she made a \$24 down payment in an unfulfilled plot to have him killed.

In jail was Mrs. Margaret Susan Platt, mother of two children, awaiting arraignment Monday. Also held, but charged with embezzlement, were Hollis D. Scott, 23, a former private detective, and Wallace Mottern, 22, Prosecutor James Munro said Scott admitted taking the money from Mrs. Platt and asking Mottern to pose as a "gunman" but the two men denied any intention of killing Wilford Platt, 34, the husband.

"Wilford wanted to make love every night of our 15 years of married life and I couldn't stand it," Munro said Mrs. Platt told him, in discussing her motive. "Just About Average."

Platt, in an interview with the Bremerton Sun, said this wasn't true: "I think that I am just average that way."

Munro said Mrs. Platt finally told her husband of the plot after her plans to run away with Scott fell through. Platt took her to the police.

The husband said he had suspected previously there was a plot afoot because "Margaret can't hide anything worth a darn." He added he voiced his suspicions to two other persons and told Margaret "she better not pull anything."

"Begged to be Killed"

Platt said his wife "begged me to kill her," when she telephoned from Seattle to tell him of the affair.

"I told her that if she wanted to die she could jump off a bridge or the ferry on the way back," he added, "but that I wanted no part of it."

Yesterday Platt retained an attorney for his wife and said he wanted her back.

"I love and want her back with the family," he said. "She has been a sweet wife and a good mother who loved her children."

Cpl. Danielson Sets Test Record

Minister to Start Term in Penitentiary

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 4. —(AP) William Henry Nagel today was committed to the Oregon state penitentiary to begin a two-year sentence for contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

The order by Circuit Judge Orval J. Millard of Grants Pass brought to an end 2½ years of legal maneuvering by Nagel's attorneys.

The 43-year-old Portland minister was convicted in September, 1947, of committing an indecent act in the presence of a 10-year-old Klamath Falls girl the previous May.

The conviction was appealed all the way to the United States supreme court.

Nagel's two Portland attorneys today asked Judge Millard for a suspended sentence or probation.

The request was refused.

Nagel insisted again today he is innocent and said the pulpit in a recently-organized Portland Baptist church was to be held open for him "until I come back."

Sheriff Jack Franey said Nagel will be taken to Salem tomorrow.

Mills Show More Interest In Wheat Sales

CHICAGO, Nov. 4. —(AP) —Mills took a little more interest in buying wheat on the board of trade today than some time. Their purchases helped all bread cereal contracts except July made gains of around a cent. The July contract declined.

Wheat closed ¼ lower to 1½ higher, corn was ¼ lower to ¼ higher, oats were ¼-¾ higher, rye was ¼ to 1 cent lower, soybeans were unchanged to 1½ lower and hard was 2 to 12 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Part of the mill buying in wheat was believed to be lifting of hedges against sales of flour to Holland. Strength in the bread cereal at outside markets also helped the local price.

Selling in July wheat was a continuation of the move which got under way late yesterday, following a statement by an agriculture department wheat analyst that the 1950 crop may be as large as that of 1949, despite smaller acreage, and that government support prices may be 10 cents lower.
