

Leahy's, Cadets Roll On; Cowboys, Cornell Lose

Boston Skein Also Snapped

Oakies Top Missouri; Buckeyes Slap Illini

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(P)—Notre Dame and Army got the scare of their football lives before winning today but that was nothing compared to what happened to Cornell, Boston University, Wyoming and Michigan State.

Cornell, Boston U and Wyoming all were pushed from the ranks of the unbeaten while Michigan State, rated one of the nation's best off its showing against Notre Dame, bowed to Oregon State, 25 to 20.

Even with Charlie Justice on the sidelines, an aroused North Carolina eleven held raunted Notre Dame to a 6 to 6 deadlock before 67,000 cheering fans in the first half. The good thing couldn't last, however, and when Bobby Williams' passes began clicking it was all over. The Irish won their 35th game without a defeat, 42 to 6.

Jack Macmillan personally brought Army its 14 to 13 verdict over a battered Pennsylvania outfit. He converted both touchdowns.

Dartmouth pushed Cornell out of the unbeaten ranks and also off the top rung in the Ivy league with a 16 to 7 verdict. Maryland, beaten only by Michigan State, burst Boston U's bubble, 14 to 13, and Wyoming was manhandled by Baylor, 32 to 7.

Oklahoma, rated No. 3 in the AP's weekly poll, won the Big Seven crown and its 18th straight game by crushing Missouri, 27 to 7. A blazing Yale last half drive fell short and Princeton won its third straight Big Three championship. The score was 21 to 13. Meanwhile Harvard, Yale's remaining foe, lost to Brown, 28 to 14.

Ohio State trounced Illinois, 30 to 17, and set up the Big Ten title and possibly the Rose Bowl nomination as the prize for next week's tussle with Michigan. The Wolverines trounced Indiana, 20 to 7, to stay on top with the Buckeyes. Other games saw Minnesota dump Pittsburgh, 24 to 7, Purdue wallop Marquette, 41 to 7, and Northwestern spill Colgate, 39 to 20 in non-conference affairs. Wisconsin bashed Iowa, 35 to 13.

In the Southeastern circuit Tulane stepped further in the foreground with a 41 to 14 victory over Vanderbilt. Georgia Tech was eliminated from the race by losing to Alabama, 20 to 7. Auburn and Georgia ended in a 28-20 deadlock.

In the Southwest circuit Doak Walker brought Southern Methodist a 34 to 0 victory over Arkansas but Froggie Williams and his Rice playmates kept on top in the league race with a 13 to 0 victory over Texas A&M. Texas Christian spilled Texas, 14 to 13.

Lewis Drills WU Cagers

Williamette U basketball coach Johnny Lewis will send his Bearcat cage aspirants into another week of drills Monday in preparation for the seasonal opener with the College of Puget Sound here December 2.

Lewis has 30 prospects in suits and has been tutoring them, mostly in fundamentals, for Johnny Lewis slightly more than a week. Of the 30 there are only four upperclassmen, and Guard Pete Bryant of Astoria is the only letterman in the quartet. There is but one returning member of last year's starting five also, Ted Loder of

Milwaukie. Gone are the famed "Johnson Act" of Ted, Jim and Bob Johnson, and Guard Tommy Warren. All but Ted Johnson graduated. He is out of action this season.

Lewis will depend chiefly upon the numerous talented freshmen of last season and hopes enough will have improved sufficiently to make the Bearcats another Northwest conference title threat. These include George Matile, Hugh Belinger, Cliff Girod, Chuck Robinson and Claude Nordhill. Returning reserves from last year's team include Doug Logue of Astoria, Dick Brouwer and Lou Scrivens of Portland and Reg Waters of Washington.

The Bearcats have a schedule of 26 games lined up for the season.

Hauk Herding Viks Through Cage Drills

The latter four have been unable to practice because of football chores, however. Some of the Jayvee lettermen of a season ago who are battling for varsity berths are Don Anderson, Larry Baggett, Larry Chamberlain, Dick Dean, Wayne Walling, Gordy Sloan, Layton Gilson and Buzz Covalt. Ramsey Miller and Tom Walden, also out for the team, were with the Sophs last year.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 12.—(P)—Army ran its unbeaten string to 19 games today by edging underdog Pennsylvania, 14-13, in a football melodrama that was settled by Jack Macmillan's unerring placement kicks.

Pennsylvania, bottling up army's great Quarterback Arnold Galiffa, twice came within bare yards of additional touchdowns. The vast throng of 78,000 that jammed Franklin field stayed to the bitter end of the cold, gloomy day. It was Pennsylvania's big line that took a lot of lustre off an army team expected to run up a big score on the twice beaten Quakers.

Pennsylvania made 23 first downs to 10 for Army, and twice put on drives that fouled tragically.
