

Back to Work Parades Form In Steel Cities

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 12—(AP)—Back to work parades of cheering thousands today put America's economic lifeline—steel—back in business after a 42-day strike costing nearly a billion dollars. Smoke billowed from mill stacks across the country. Workers celebrated and then geared the giant industry for top production early in the week ahead.

The jubilant CIO United steelworkers who won their insurance and pension started sweeping scattered holdout firms into the contract fold. Fewer than 100,000 are still idle out of the more than 500,000 who struck October 1.

All top producers now are signed. Even the government said there is no steel crisis any more since production quickly goes back to near normal.

90% of Industry
Some of the little fellows haven't signed. But Union President Philip Murray predicts 90 per cent of the industry will be under contract by Monday.

Contract talks went on everywhere. In Pittsburgh, the union signed two midwestern iron mining firms—Ogelsby Norton company and M. A. Hanna company employing 4,400.

Major holdouts include Allegheny-Ludlum, 12,500 employes, Crucible Steel, Pittsburgh; Steel, Sharon (Pa.) Steel and Wheeling (W. Va.) Steel. Allegheny Ludlum and Wheeling are near agreement.

Results of Strike
Here are the results of America's most costly steel strike:
1. Steelworkers obtained \$100 a month company financed pensions including social security. They also got a five-cent hourly insurance program in which they pay half the cost.

2. The nation lost on conservation estimates \$725,000,000 in steel wages and steel productions, other

hundreds of millions indirectly. Murray was happy over the settlement.

Maj. Horton is the son of Leroy F. Horton of Wichita. He attended the University of Missouri and is a member of Phi Gamma Delta social fraternity. During World War II he served with the army in Italy.

Soviet Envoy Ignores Slav Charge at U.N.

LAKE SUCCESS, Nov. 12—(AP)—Soviet Ambassador Alexander Panvushkin stalked out of a United Nations meeting today rather than reply to Yugoslav charges that Russian troops are concentrated on Yugoslavia's borders.

"I consider it beneath my dignity to answer the slanders of the representative of the Tito clique," said Panvushkin in the U. N. assembly's social committee.

He brushed aside Yugoslav Delegate Vladimir Dedjier's accusation yesterday that Russia had concentrated troops on the border, refused to let Yugoslav children in Russian schools go home, and refused to take home Russian citizens living in Yugoslavia. He then left the meeting of the 59-nation social committee.

Ostrich Answer
"That is the answer of an ostrich," said Dedjier looking pointedly at Panvushkin's empty chair.

Soviet adviser, V. M. Zonov, rushed in to occupy the Russian position at the conference table.

Czechoslovak Delegate Frantisek Vrba hit back in the verbal battle Panvushkin had scorned.

Slavs Denounced
Vrba denounced the Yugoslav accusations against the Soviet Union as being "like a thief who shouts 'stop thief' to confuse the pursuit."

He also accused Yugoslavia of having thrown out thousands of Greek rebels, who fled to Yugoslavia after defeat by the Greek government. He said they were expelled into Hungary, without warning, in September with the alternative of being sent back to Greece.

Vrba said these Greek fugitives now have "peaceful, happy lives" in Czechoslovakia.

Dedjier spoke next and described as absurd Soviet bloc charges that Yugoslavia was pursuing an aggressive policy.

"How could my little country invade a vast area stretching from the Adriatic to the Pacific," he asked.

Premier Marshal Tito's representative also denied that his country had expelled any Greek refugees. There were 35,000 in Yugoslavia, he declared, and of these 3,000 had asked, and been granted, permission to go to Hungary.

Judge Medina 'Assassination Plot' Debunked

NEW YORK, Nov. 12—(AP)—After eight hours of investigation, police tonight said a reported death plot against Judge Harold R. Medina was nothing but "big shot talk" by four young people.

They released all four with a warning and called off the heavy guard they had thrown around the 61-year-old judge's New York apartment.

Medina presided over the nine-month communist conspiracy trial.

"There is absolutely nothing to the idea of a plot," detectives said. "We are convinced that these people have nothing to do with any plot against Judge Medina," detectives said.

A flurry of investigation started this evening when two young men told the FBI here that the two girls had said the judge would be "done away with sometime in the next few weeks."

CHINESE REDS DRIVE
CHUNGKING, China, Nov. 12—(AP)—The Chinese communists drove ahead today in their campaign to split the nationalist holdings on the mainland. Official nationalist reports said the reds were within 75 miles east of Kweichow, capital of Kweichow province.

The bride's grandfather is the late Alfred T. Ringling, circus founder. Her father is the late Richard Ringling. And her stepfather, who gave her in marriage, is James A. Haley, who at one time was president of the circus.

The referendum on a law which would ban daylight time in Oregon will be held next November—leaving one summer during which there is no rule in the matter.

The committee hopes to persuade individual communities in Oregon and western Washington to adopt fast time next summer, as many did this year.
