Cleveland Group Said Making Negotiations

CLEVELAND, Nov. 15 (AP) Mayor Thomas A. Burke disclosed Tuesday that prospective new owners of the Cleveland Indians are discussing with city officials a new contract for rental of the stadium.

He declined to name the group dicker with the city, but Ellis W. Ryan, Cleveland insurance man, was reported to have talked with Burke.

Ryan is head of a syndicate known to be seeking to buy the club. Reports freely circulated here said the Indians' president, Bill Veck, is expected to shortly announce sale of the club to Ryan's group.

Earlier, the Cleveland News said that Hank Greenberg is expected to move up from vice president to general manager if the club is sold to Ryan.

Ryan, however, denied he had discussed the matter with the one-time Detroit Tigers slugger. Greenberg likewise denied he had received an offer.

At Chicago, Veck declined to confirm the imminence of the deal. "I still own the ball club, but I can't say that I'll own it tomorrow night," he said.

Arcaro Horse Smashes Mark

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—Ed Arcaro, master saddlemith, drove King Ranch's Flying Missal to a new world record in winning the \$20,000-added two mile and one-sixteenth Danversfield handicap at Jamaica. It was the final program of the 196-day New York racing season, and 27,064 turned out for the Empire City-at-Jamaica feature.

Flying Missal sliced three-fifths of a second from the world record set on Oct. 28, 1945 at the same track by Eurasian. Flying Missal was timed in 3:32.4.

Troy's Powers Out for Season

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15 (AP)—Jim Powers, ace quarterback for the USC Trojans and leading passer in the Pacific Coast conference, was hospitalized today with a chipped hip bone. Coach Jeff Cravath said he will be out of action for the rest of the season.

Cravath said Powers hurt the hip in the Stanford game Nov. 8 but the extent of the injury wasn't discovered until today. The loss of Powers hurts USC's chances considerably in Saturday's annual grudge game with the UCLA Bruins.

Gill Steps Up Beaver Basket Drills as Opening Tilt Looms

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Nov. 15 (Special)—With only two weeks remaining before the opener against Portland university in Portland on December 1, Coach Slat Gill has stepped up the practice tempo this week for his defending Pacific Coast conference champion Oregon State basketball squad.

The Beavers are running through full scrimmage sessions and Gill is getting his squad pretty well shaken down. However, a good 20 men are still in the battle for spots on the 12-man traveling squad.

If Gill had to name his starting lineup this week it probably would have been Len Rineerson and Bob Payne at forwards; Ed Fleming, center; and Bill Harper and Dick Ballantyne, guards. All except Payne are lettermen and he is a standout transfer from San Francisco junior college. At 6 feet, 3 inches tall and with a good shooting eye and speed, Payne may be the man to fill all-American Cliff Crandall's shoes. A second combination has Ray Snyder, Glen Kinney or Jim Padgett at forwards; Harvey Watt, center, and Tommy Holman and Jack Detour, guards. Padgett is a promising sophomore and the rest are veterans.

Gill is very pleased with the continued improvement of his class crop of sophomores up from last season's once-beaten Rook quintet. In addition to Padgett, Jack Orr, George Allison, Jim Nau and Don White are looking better all the time. After taking on Portland in the opener, the Beavers will invade the east for five games against top-notch opponents climaxed with a Madison Square Garden appearance against New York university on December 8. First home games in the new Gill coliseum are against Utah on December 16 and 17.
