

Unfair Practice Ruling Upheld Against Union

PORTLAND, Nov. 21—(P)—The national labor relations board has upheld a hearing examiner's ruling that CIO marine unions involved in a waterfront dispute at Coos Bay were guilty of unfair labor practices.

NLRB Spokesman Robert J. Weiner said today that the CIO maritime unions were defendants. They were charged with illegal coercion of employees of the Irwin-Lyons Lumber company. The dispute involved a jurisdiction claim by the CIO cooks, stewards and engine room workers on the jobs aboard the company's lumber schooner Rolando last April. The ship was manned by AFL union members.

A dispute involving loading of the schooner was settled earlier this year with CIO longshoremen signed to do the work.

The board dismissed company charges against the CIO longshoremen and also turned down a secondary boycott claim by the employers against the union. The NLRB held that the Coos Bay Boom company, which was picketed in the dispute, and the Irwin-Lyons Lumber company were of the same ownership and not two separate employers.

The board also disagreed with the examiner who had determined that the longshore union was responsible for beating up two company employees. The board held the action was away from the picket lines and there was no evidence the union officers provoked the attack.

County to Call Bids on Street Improvements

Construction bids on proposed improvement of several roads northeast of Salem will be advertised in the near future, the Marion county court announced Monday.

The roads include Brenna and Jelden avenues and 34th Street. Expenses of proposed improvements will be assessed to property owners in the area who meet recently with the court to hear cost estimates.

Another meeting of residents with the court is scheduled after bids are in. The court has reserved the right to reject bids if property owners believe costs of construction would be excessive.

Judge Grant Murphy said improvements would include grading, graveling and surfacing with asphalt-type pavement. He also said a drainage project would be included if it were found necessary.

Wounded Lebanon Woman Still in Critical Condition

LEBANON, Nov. 21 — Mrs. Lorens Rook Martel, 32, who was found in a hotel room here Saturday night with a bullet wound in her stomach, remained in critical condition today.

The woman was taken to Lebanon Community hospital from a local hotel. Coroner Glenn Huston found her unconscious with a .44 calibre revolver beside her.

Huston said the wound was self-inflicted. Because Mrs. Martel is in too serious a condition to be questioned, Huston said today it is not known whether the shot was accidental.

Explosive Found Under Rail Bridge

NELSON, B.C., Nov. 21 —(CP)—Provincial police tonight reported here that dynamite had been found planted in a wooden water culvert under the CPR tracks at Glade, B.C., 16 miles west of Nelson. They said it evidently had been there over night.

The fuse was described as a type used in bombings in Doukhobor areas. It had failed to ignite the regular fuse which was to set off the blast. The explosive materials had been removed from the boxes and made into a mushy substance, then covered by paper and gunnysacks in the culvert.

The explosives have been removed from the scene and a track patrol established.

Julius Smith

ALBANY — Julius Smith, 72, of Albany died in the St. Vincent hospital Sunday, following a brief illness. Funeral services will be held from the Fortmiller-Fredrickson chapel in Albany at 2:30 p.m., Wednesday with Rev. Orville Mick officiating. Burial will be in Willamette Memorial park.

Born in Chicago, Ill. July 22, 1877, Smith came to Oregon in 1898 and located in the Providence community, where he lived for 38 years. Since 1936 he had made his home in Albany. He was a member of the Christian church, and for some time had been caretaker at the Albany public library. In Vancouver, Wash., on March 13, 1942, Smith married Mrs. Anna B. Schiler, who survives as does a daughter by a former marriage, Mrs. G. L. Chaney of Lebanon, and two stepsons, Edwin R. Schiler of Vallejo, Calif., and Paul E. Schiler of Nesele, Wash. Surviving also are two sisters, Mrs. Mary Bartholomew of Denver, Colo., and Mrs. Anna KaRay of Grivity, Iowa; and three grandchildren, Sharon, Douglas and Judy Lee Chaney all of Lebanon.

Arthur Grant Gillmore

ALBANY — Arthur Grant Gillmore, 64, died at Albany General hospital Sunday following an extended illness. Funeral services will be held from the Donnellson Sewack chapel in Hillsboro at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday under direction of the Fisher Funeral Home of Albany. Rev. Clarence Forsberg of Hillsboro will officiate. Burial will be in Fir Lawn cemetery at Hillsboro.

Arthur Gillmore was born May 8, 1885, in Alexandria, Minn., but came to Oregon when young and had spent the greater part of his life at Hillsboro, coming to Albany two years ago. He served as division superintendent of the Tualatin Valley division of the Portland General Power Co., retiring two years ago. Since then he had made

his home with his daughter, Mrs. John R. Baines, and family in Albany.

On June 3, 1908, at Hillsboro, Gillmore married Addie Lee Lane. She died in 1946. Surviving are two daughters and a son, Mrs. Baines and Richard H. Gillmore both of Albany, and Mrs. Robert F. Main of Portland; also a brother, Rosell Gillmore and a sister, Mrs. Mary Butterfield both of Minneapolis, Minn.; and nine grandchildren.

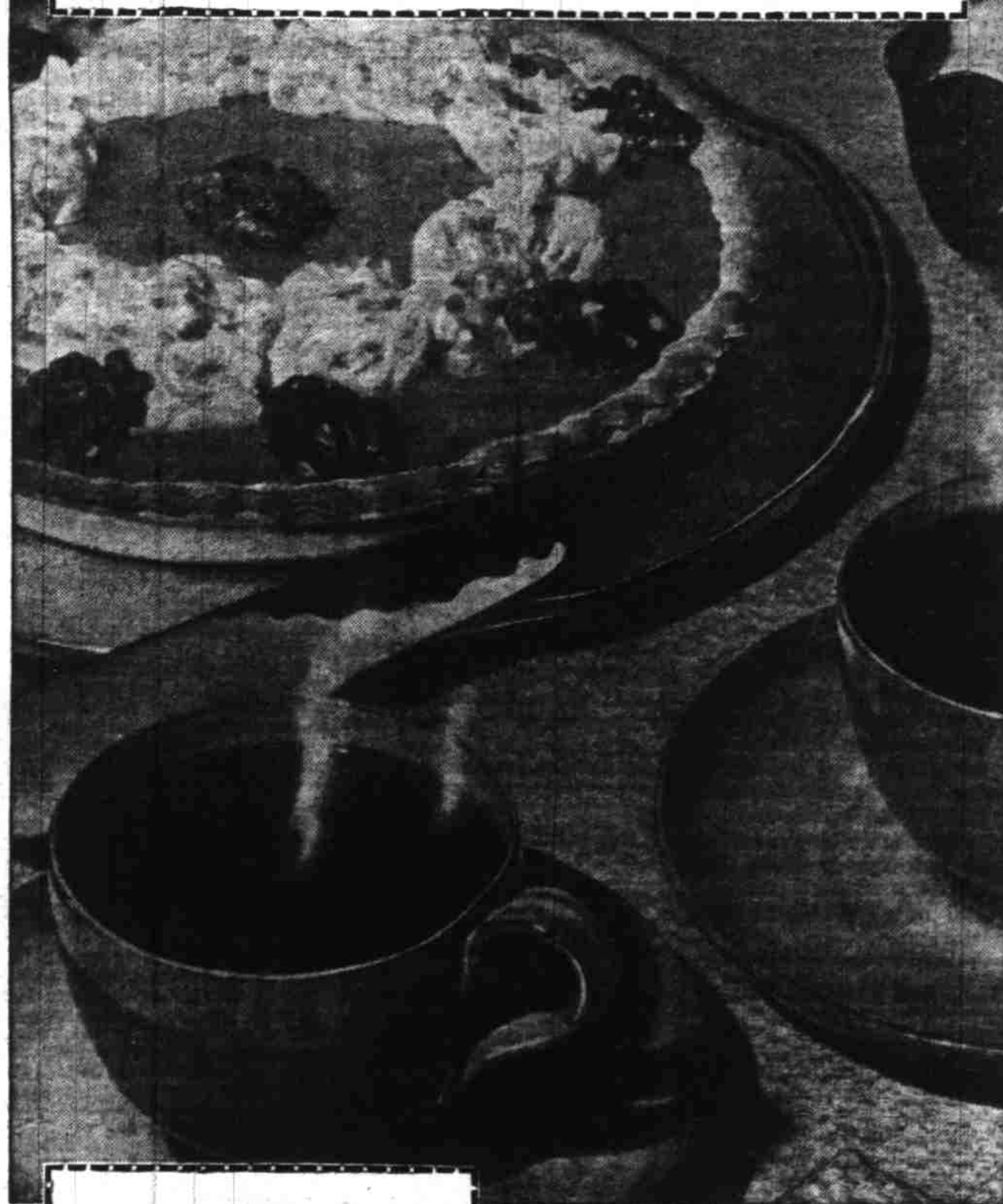

PUMPKIN-PINEAPPLE PIE

1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1 cup crushed pineapple (3-oz. can)
1 cup canned pumpkin
2 beaten egg yolks
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup crushed pineapple
Pecan nut mix
1/2 cup heavy cream
Candied cherries or nutmeats

Soften gelatin in cold water. Heat pumpkin in top of double boiler. Mix beaten egg yolks with 1/2 cup sugar, add salt, crushed pineapple with juice, stir into the pumpkin. Stir over boiling water 3 minutes. Add gelatin, beat until well blended, chill until syrupy. Beat egg whites, fold in 1/4 cup sugar and then fold in the pumpkin mixture. Pour into 9-inch baked pie shell or into pan lined with crumbs (corn flakes or Graham cracker) pastry. Chill until firm and garnish with whipped cream and candied cherries or nutmeats.
