Maryland, COP'ers Nab Convincing Wins

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 -(A)- Corpell wrapped up its second straight lvy league football championship with a 29-21 victory over Penn today while Maryland made an impressive bid for bowl recognition with a 47-7 triumph over West

Another conference championship was decided at Denver where the Wyoming Cowboys won Skyline Six honors by downing Denver, 25-6.

In other western games Utah triumphed over Utah State, 34-0. and Nevada trounced North Texas State, 28-7,
