

Federal Con Escapes from McNeil Island

McNEIL ISLAND, Wash., Nov. 24 (AP)—Federal prison officials said Wednesday they believed an escaped 55-year-old bank robber may have made his way across the treacherous mile-wide channel which separates this island prison from the mainland.

A thorough search of the island's brush-covered 4,400 acres have failed to reveal any trace of the missing prisoner, Henry Clay Tollett, who has been missing since the noon checkup Tuesday. His home is in Ada, Okla.

Federal bureau of investigation officials, however, said that there had been no intensification of a mainland search for the missing man.

The density of the island undergrowth would make it possible for the prisoner to escape detection for days. Prison officials theorized that hunger and cold might drive him out within a few days if he remained on the island.

Tollett was convicted of bank robbery and assault with a dangerous weapon in Portland, Ore., in 1948. He has served four terms in the Oklahoma state penitentiary for robbery, larceny and auto theft.
