Parent-Teacher Conference Set At Monmouth

MONMOUTH — The first Oregon college conference on parent-teacher cooperation will meet January 19 on the Oregon College of Education's campus here, Dr. H. M. Gunn, state director of elementary teacher training, announced.

Purpose of the conference is to bring together leaders in Oregon teacher education and members of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Goal of the meeting is to plan and set up a working relationship between the congress and teacher training schools. Specific action is sought on establishment of a course in community relationships for teachers in each of the schools; this course would include a study of the workings of the P-TA and its value to the home, the pupil and the teacher.

The only such course now offered in Oregon is included as part of school organization classes at OCE. Success of the classes here has led to the movement to establish them in all other teacher training schools in the state.

Other colleges who have indicated they will send representatives to the conference include University of Oregon, Oregon State college, Lindfield college,

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Volunteer Firemen Set Enviably 1949 Record at Four Corners

FOUR CORNERS—The Four Corners volunteer firemen's annual report on their activities in the Four Corners rural fire protection district for the year of 1949 has again demonstrated what co-operation and the spirit of Community Welfare can accomplish.

Twenty-eight calls for fire were answered with one false alarm. Total value of property at risk for buildings and contents were \$980,000. Total loss was \$93,000, of which \$60,000 was the penitentiary annex fire, reducing the loss to the district to \$33,000.

152 Calls Answered
The number of men responding to all calls totals 152, averaging 6.2 men per fire. Salem was asked for assistance twice and the Four Corners department assisted Salem once. There were no accidents or injuries received by the men while on a fire call.

A new heating plant and hose dryer has been installed in the fire house. Eighty-eight fire permits were issued with no fires getting out of control. Forty-four fire hazards were reported with 30 of them removed. The firemen express appreciation for the splendid cooperation they received from the state fire marshal's office.
