## Game Law Violators in Detroit Area

DETROIT — Della Rose Elaine Eaves and her husband, Roy Gene Eaves, were arrested on a charge of possession of stolen property valued at \$93 on December 28 by state police. The couple was arraigned in Idanha and Mrs. Eaves was turned over to juvenile authorities in Salem while her husband was bound over to the grand jury.

Earlier in December Walter Dozler of Stayton was charged with wanton waste of game and was fined \$154 in Albany justice court. Bruce Albert Dozler, also of Stayton, was charged with killing a deer with less than forked horns and in a closed season and was fined \$154 in the Albany justice court.

Leroy Harold Fehlen and John Edward Mack of Stayton were both charged with hunting ducks after hours on December 20 and were each fined \$14 in Stayton justice court.

Five men, all of Detroit, were charged on December 21 with possession of venison in closed season and were fined \$154 each in Albany justice court. The men were Lawrence Newell Trask, Phillip Edward Robinson, George Robert Winters and Charles Robert Winters.
