Most persons ask relatives or friends for help in getting a job without giving thought to the nature of the employment, says Nejelski in the American magazine. He says a person should approach job-getting in a systematic manner instead of just going to work for anyone in any line of endeavor. He urges job-seekers to make full use of reliable vocational-guidance clinics or aptitude-testing services or seek counsel from such organizations as the YMCA, U.S. or state employment services.
