Fresh Fruit

Luscious Fruit Takes Center of Culinary Stage for the Season

Each year the Calavo people put out a lovely new booklet of recipes. Each year they send me a box of the fruit for trying out the new recipes.

Each year we fill up on those lovely green avocados and bless the growers of the luscious fruit. All the time realizing that we aren't helping our figure any. So we cut out sweets and limit starches to morning toast for the Calavo-eating period, and at least hold our own in weight.

First thing in the morning, we enjoy a piece of toast, spread with the softened fruit, and sprinkled with salt. It's one of our favorite ways to enjoy the avocados.

For plain half-shell serving, we prefer a tart French dressing, or lemon juice. For salads, we like to combine grapefruit segments and the avocado, with French dressing.

The nature of the avocado makes it blend with either fruit or vegetable in salads. One of the suggested combinations in this year's recipe book included ½ cup sliced ripe pears, ½ cup diced celery, ½ cup diced tomato and ¼ cup green onion. This mixture is heaped in a half avocado, and moistened with French dressing into which has been put some tomato catsup.

Another salad is

CLUB SALAD

1 cup tuna or other seafood ½ cup mayonnaise
¼ cup diced celery ½ cup diced cucumber
Combine lightly, place in four avocado halves and garnish with lemon.

Mashed avocado makes a cracker or raw vegetable dip too. Combine 1 cup of the mashed fruit with 1 tablespoon lime or lemon juice, 1 teaspoon salt, 1½ teaspoons grated onion.

Avocados are used in hot dishes too. For instances in

CALAVO OMELET

Beat yolks and whites of four eggs separately. Blend ¼ teaspoon salt, ¼ cup cold water, black pepper and egg yolks into the whites. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes in a heavy skillet in 1 tablespoon melted butter. Then bake for 15 minutes in 350 degree oven. Spread with half of a mixture of ¼ cup grated American cheese, 1 cup medium thick white sauce, and 1 cup diced avocado. Fold over, and put more of the sauce on top. Serves 4.

The word, "Calavo," incidentally, designates avocados of top quality grown in California. There are a number of varieties of avocado, just as there are of apples or melons.

Rubber Footwear Is Now in Greatest Range of Types

Buying rubber footwear today isn't just a case of deciding whether you need overshoes, galoshes or boots. First you decide whether they are for wear over shoes or over stockings. If over shoes, then comes the style of the shoes—after that the type of rubber footwear.

That comfortable habit Mrs. Smith that farmers and other outdoor workers have long followed—wearing high boots over extra thick and warm socks or the special hair-and-wool boot pacs—has been spreading right along. This year such boots are available for women, children, and teen agers. They make sense for active outdoor expeditions—football games, shopping, outdoor play, walking and the like. These boots differ from over-the-shoe boots in their inside finish—usually a fleece lining

and a cushion sole, and often in their shape, which is narrower through the ankle for a closer fit.

Another trend evidenced this season is more use of fleece-lined leather for boots. These are made with wet-proof soles so that they are practical for snow as well as extremely cold weather.

The demands of current footwear fashions are so exacting, insofar as soles and heel heights and types are concerned, that many new types of rubber overshoes are being made. At least one high fashion manufacturer is making up rubber footwear designed for the most important of his own regular shoe types—platforms and the very delicate strap evening sandals. The latter are best served by the erstwhile carriage boot.

Before buying your own overshoes, galoshes or boots, decide on that matter of heel type and height. To be sure of this, measure the inside of the heel for height (and jot it down!), then the width of the heel base from front to back.
