## Bloodmobile To Visit City; Donors Needed

The Marion county Red Cross chapter Monday appealed to blood donors to "drop in" at the bloodmobile visit at First Methodist church from 2 to 6 p.m. today.

Due to numerous accidents around the state the blood supply at the Portland blood bank is at low ebb and some types are completely lacking, a spokesman reported.

A group of state employees as well as workers at several private firms will provide the nucleus for today's visit by the mobile blood unit.

The county Red Cross chapter handled 193 cases and extended \$591 in grants and loans during December, it was reported Monday.

Home nursing certificates were issued to 144 adults and 44 high school girls last month, according to Mrs. Ralph Moody, chairman of the nursing service program.

Mrs. Mark Astrup, junior Red Cross chairman, reported that 754 holiday tray favors had been prepared for hospital patients by that group.

A course will be conducted here during February to train Red Cross instructors. Marion county also will be host to a district gathering of junior Red Cross leaders in February.

## Hospitals Still On ACS List

Four Salem hospitals are on the approved list of the American College of Surgeons which was made public Monday. They are: Oregon state hospital, Oregon state tuberculosis hospital, Salem General hospital and Salem Memorial hospital.

Approval signifies that the hospitals meet specified standards as to equipment, sanitation, organization and operation as set up by the College of Surgeons. The four local hospitals have been on the approved list for a number of years.

## Truman Budget Includes Fund For Bonneville

PORTLAND, Jan. 9-(AP)—The \$69,000,000 budgeted today for the Bonneville administration will help finance five new major transmission lines.

Administrator Paul J. Raver said the money also would provide further work on four lines already under construction.

He said the five new major lines would not all be completed in the 1950-51 year.

Two of them will run from McNary dam, one via Maupin and Detroit to Albany, Ore., and the other via The Dalles to Portland. A third will go from McNary through The Dalles-Maupin to Klamath Falls with completion by 1953. Ultimately this line also will go northward to Eugene.

Another circuit will run from the Columbia substation to the Olympia line to boost power in the Puget Sound region. Power from Hungry Horse dam will be integrated in the system by another circuit, a Grand Coulee-Spokane line.

The four lines now under construction are: Grand Coulee-Columbia; Columbia-Midway; Grand Coulee-Snohomish No. 2; Hungry Horse-Hot Springs-Anaconda.
