

Fesler Stays With Buckeyes

Wes Ignores Outside Job, Is Given Raise.

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 9.—(AP)—Wes Fesler decided today to remain as Ohio State university's head football coach.

In making his decision, Fesler accomplished three things:

- 1—Set at rest a six-week rumor that he would desert the Bucks for a \$25,000 per year job in the business world;
- 2—Killed "on the vine" a series of prospective booms for possible successors; and
- 3—Assured his future welfare and security by getting a \$1500 raise to \$16,000 a year, and a board of trustee promise of a full professorship in the physical education department, if and when he gives up the coaching job.

Fesler talked the whole thing over late Saturday with university president Howard L. Bevis and three members of the board of trustees.

The result was announced today in statements by the coach and pressy, a few minutes after a board meeting.

Curly-haired, 41-year old Fesler, who led the Bucks to the Big Ten co-championship, and a Rose Bowl victory over California in the recent campaign, said:

"I'm extremely gratified that the president, the board of trustees and especially my boss, Dick Lar-kins, have taken such an interest in my future. I'm awfully happy to remain at the place I love."

President Bevis said:

"Coach Fesler has frankly admitted he was considering offers to enter the business world. He has just as frankly said he wanted to remain at the university, and only considered leaving in the interests of his family's future welfare and security."

Although he declined to name any college, Leib said a school which is "not" either in or near a big city "Industrial de-velo-pment must be a major college-ate eleven. "If this is the case," he added, "then they ought to get out of major football and stay in their own class."

The top question before the NCAA annual meeting in New York this week, Leib explained, is "whether the will to make the sanity code work is there."

"If it isn't we ought to junk the rule and start over again," he continued, "but if we do have the will to make it work then every member should comply with it."

Hockey Fight Again Looms

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The United States Olympic association may continue its fight with the International Ice Hockey federation, Richard F. Vaughan said today.

Vaughan, Princeton university hockey coach and chairman of the U. S. Olympic ice hockey committee, told a reporter that the United States Olympic organization would ask the international Olympic committee next May to give it permission to organize international competition in the sport on a basis that meets the American definition of amateur.

American Olympic members claim the present governing body for ice hockey permits professionalism in the sport.

Ice hockey was the center of an international squabble at the 1948 Olympic games in St. Moritz, Switzerland.

Siemering Gets Jump in Salary

STOCKTON, Calif., Jan. 9.—(AP)—Big Larry Siemering, who coached College of the Pacific to an eleven-victory unbeaten football season, was rewarded today with a new one-year contract and a salary increase. The college employs athletic coaches on a yearly tenure. Siemering's new salary is believed to be close to \$10,000.

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But Rickey Just Laughs

Robinson-to-Braves Rumors Circulating

BROOKLYN, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Is Branch Rickey preparing to unload Jackie Robinson, the sparkplug of two Brooklyn pennant winners? The idea seems preposterous, and perhaps it is, but the report has been popping up ever since the winter baseball meetings, and here it is again today.

The latest version has Rickey, uneasy over rumors that Jackie has his mind set on a \$50,000 contract, thinking seriously of selling his great Negro second-baseman to the Boston Braves.

Rickey, himself, was not in the city today to discuss the matter, being enroute to Fort Worth, Tex.

Renewal of the "sell Jackie Robinson" story evoked a hearty laugh from Brooklyn Dodger President Branch Rickey here today.

"Excuse me," said Rickey, "but it's a joke."

Then he declared Brooklyn is "not selling players it needs."

Rickey had no comment about the proposed \$50,000 contract for Robinson.

as, in his private plans to look over a new ball park he is building there.

In his absence, a Dodger spokesman was inclined to scoff at the suggestion. He said he was almost certain the man with the outside eyebrows had not talked with Boston club officials since the winter meeting.

At a press conference last week, Rickey said he had not discussed salary with Robinson and commented, placidly, he had never had a real holdout since he took over the Brooklyn club and didn't anticipate any this year.

Robinson was paid in the neighborhood of \$20,000 for being the most valuable player in the National league last year. He has not stated publicly that he wants \$50,000, but neither has he become angry when it was suggested to him he should receive that figure in 1950.

The Robinson-to-Boston report possibly owes its refusal to die to the well known fact Rickey never has paid that kind of money to ball players—he will sell them rather than submit to the financial pain.

1st Woman Club Owner Succumbs

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Mrs. Helene Hathaway Robinson Bigsby, 71, the first woman to own a big league baseball club, died at her home here last night, it was disclosed today. Mrs. Bigsby was president and owner of the St. Louis Cardinals for six years before for selling the club in 1918. She had inherited it from her uncle, Martin Stanley Robinson. Her father, the late Frank DeHass also was owner of the club.

Jimmy Foxx led the American league in striking out for seven years during his career—a major record.
