Onion Growers Happy Despite Big Price Drop from December

While onion growers in the Lake Labish area aren't bragging about this winter, they do report more satisfaction than did the celery growers who had to put a part of their 1949 crop back underground.

Ronald Jones, manager of the Labish Celery Growers, which cooperative also includes 23 onion growers, said Tuesday he believed demand would take care of the onions still unsold before the end of the season. Estimates made Tuesday indicated that there are about 350 carloads of onions still in the hands of the growers. This number is out of a total of 1200 carloads harvested.

A number of carloads are being held by dealers who bought earlier in the season before the price dropped. It is not expected that Chicago holders of the Labish onions would ship their purchases east at present prices. Instead they will probably be re-sold on the coast area.

"The trouble has been that the gamblers put the price up too high in the beginning," Jones stated, "and when they got out of the market it is hard for the growers to realize that their price has been cut in two. What was bringing \$5.25 in December is now standing at \$2.75."

But Jones explained that \$2 at harvest time covers all expenses and pays the growers a fair salary for their work. This is comparable to the \$2.75 now. The difference in the higher price is taken up in storage and shrinkage costs, he explained.

Had the market stayed at around \$3 it would have been a good price all the way around and been good for the onion market itself, Jones said. When the market started at \$4 in September sales simply froze, he explained.

A large acreage of onions is being planned for this spring, Jones said.

"I expect to see as large if not larger acreage than usual," was his comment.

Safety, Riding Comfort Are Features Cited

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 10.—The 1950 Plymouth car, declared to have important styling changes and improvements for safety and riding comfort, will go on display Thursday in dealer showrooms throughout the country including Salem, Ore.

There are new lines in the silhouette which give the new Plymouth a longer, lower, more streamlined appearance, officers say. The changes are readily apparent whether viewed from front, rear, or side.

Rear fenders, which are bolted on for economical removal in case repairs are necessary, have been restyled and lengthened. A larger rear window on club coupes and four-door sedans, slightly greater over-all width, and alterations on the rear deck provide a longer, heavier, road-hugging appearance for all models. The grille has been simplified and made more massive.

Described as "packed with value and ready to prove it," the new Plymouth was characterized by D. S. Eddins, president of Plymouth, as "the greatest car value we have ever offered the public."

"When we speak of value," Eddins said, "we mean that we have combined beauty with sensible styling, that we have achieved big-car performance with small-car economy, and that the mechanical excellence of which we have always been proud has maintained its high level."

The new Plymouth line includes nine automobiles in the special deluxe and deluxe groups, available in nine colors.

Stock Market Weathers Profit Taking

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(AP)—The stock market weathered another beating today by traders cashing in their profits. In addition to a good many stocks ended with modest gains, although declines still out-numbered advances by a good-sized margin.

Volume topped the 2,000,000-share mark for the fourth full day in a row. Sales amounted to 2,160,000 shares compared with 2,530,000 Monday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks remained at 73.2, the highest point since August 1946. Declines in the industrial and utility groups were balanced by a gain in the railroad division, which showed a good rise largely because of a 7-point jump in Nickel Plate R.R.

The market once more was extremely broad, with 1,185 individual issues traded. Of these 526 declined and 363 advanced.

New highs for 1949-50 were established during the day by 103 stocks while none touched a low for the period.

Grain Develops Firm Tone in Day's Trading

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Grains developed a firm tone at the board of trade today, following yesterday's decline. Some indications of export business combined with a buying and some short covering, cold wave to promote scattered wheat started easy, and firming on floor reports that some flour business is in prospect through the production and marketing administration. There was little selling interest in the corn pit, and soybeans advanced on export reports.

At the finish wheat was 1 cent to 1 1/2 cents higher, corn was 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents higher, oats was 1/4 to one cent higher, rye was 1 cent to 1 1/2 cents higher, soybeans were 1/2 to 1 cent higher and wheat was 1/2 to 1 cent to 10 cents a hundredweight higher.

The weekly government weather report indicates some damage may have been done winter wheat by cold weather which hit the south-west where sufficient snow covering was lacking. In addition to that, only one car of wheat was listed as received here today.

The extract, containing 70 per cent alcohol, was set ablaze before serving.
