Estimates made Tuesday indicated that there are about 350 carloads of onions still in the hands of the growers. This number is out of a total of 1200

A number of carloads are being held by dealers who bought earlier in the season before the price dropped. It is not expected that Chicago holders of the Labish onions would ship their purchases east at present prices. In-stead these will probably be resold on the coast area.


"The trouble has been that the gamblers put the price up too high in the beginning," Jones stated, "and when they got out of the market it is hard for the growers to realize that their price has been cut in two. What was bringing \$5.25 in December is now standing at \$2.75."

But Jones explained that \$2 at harvest time covers all expenses and pays the growers a fair sal-ary for their work. This is com-
