

Studio Style Bed Gives Good Service, For Double-Duty Use

From two homemakers come questions of a very serviceable double-duty bed—a sofa by day, a bed by night.

One is to be used by a teenage girl, who prefers the studio type room so that she will have a place for entertaining her friends, and the other is for a grandmother who also wants a sitting room of her own.

One of the most practical types of all the double duty beds is the studio bed. That is, for day, in and day out use, and where a certain amount of informality can be introduced into the room scheme. Here are the reasons for this statement—



Ease of operation. Other than removing the daytime cover, a studio bed offers little inconvenience. Of course, you will have to arrange for storage space for the bedding; but this is also true of many of the other dual purpose pieces.

Versatility. A studio bed is informal when used as a couch, but it can also be extremely attractive. The new rectangular pillows, which you can buy in the muslin or make yourself, give it a smart appearance and at the same time provide a substantial back rest. Covers can be made to give the room any decorative character you like, and these can be changed as the season or occasion dictate. For a teen-ager, plaid gingham is excellent, or perhaps an attractive printed plastic, if the bed is used for a lot of sitting. Grandmother may be interested in something a bit more formal, such as the same material as the draperies.
