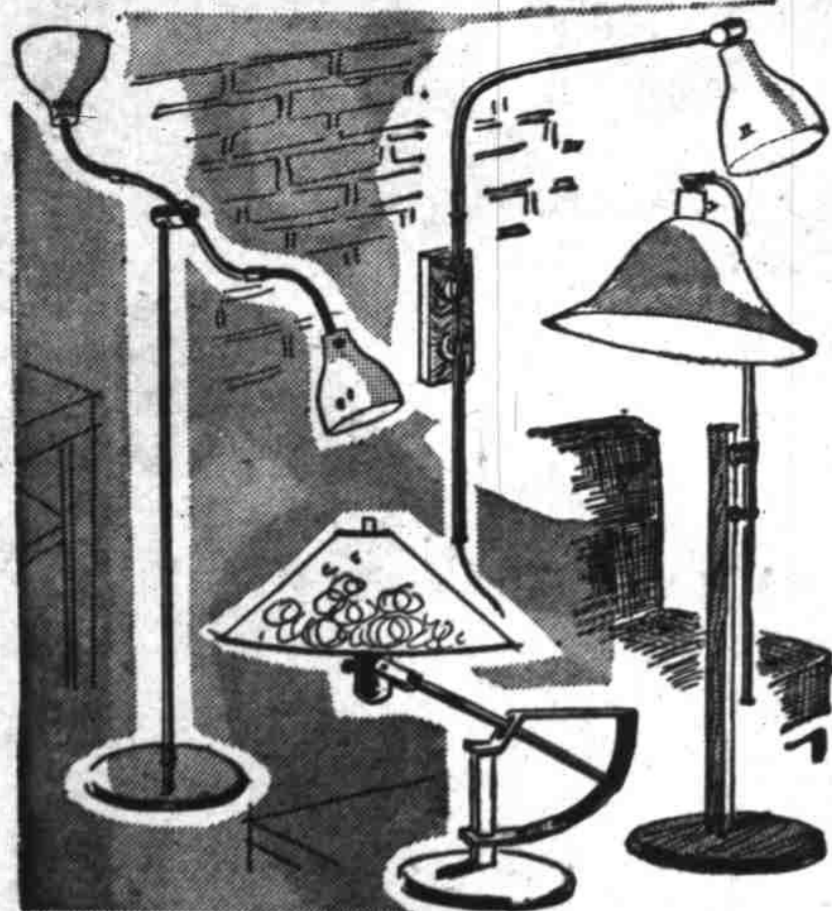


The Designing Woman



THERE'S A REASON

Strictly modern lamps are rare indeed, as any modern enthusiast will tell you. So when a leading modern designer introduces four new lamps at once they cause quite a stir, as these just did at preview showings in New York. Study these lamps and you'll see there's a reason for every line of their design. Among the four many lighting problems are solved, all with straight forward grace. The curved arm of the top floor lamp swings from vertical to horizontal and has goose neck stems for more flexibility. The ends of the pin-up lamp swings a full 180 degrees and locks at

any angle and varying heights. The shade of the second floor lamp turns up or down, rises and lowers on its base according to the height of chairs. A variation from 16 1/4 inches to 28 inches in height is possible for the table lamp, which locks at seven different stops while the shade and socket section remains in vertical balance.
