The Bible Story

(Editor's note: This is the 14th of a series from the Old Testament. The text is condensed from selections by Houston Harte for the new book, "In Our Image.")

There was a man whose name was Kish, and he had a son

whose name was Saul. And the asses of Kish were lost. Kish said to Saul, Take one of the servants, and go seek the asses. But they found them not. When they were come to Zuph, his servant said, Behold now, there is in this city a man of God; peradventure he can show us our way. And when they were come into the city, Samuel came out.

Now the Lord had told Samuel a day before Saul came, Tomorrow I will send thee a man, and thou shalt anoint him to be captain over my people Israel. And when Samuel saw Saul, the Lord said unto him, Behold the man whom I spake to thee of. Then Saul drew near to Samuel, and said, Tell me where the seer's house is. Samuel answered, I am the seer. Ye shall eat with me today, and tomorrow I will tell thee all that is in thine heart.

Samuel took a vial of oil, and poured it upon his head, and said. The Lord hath anointed thee to be captain over his inheritance. When thou art departed from me today, thou shalt come to the hill of God, and thou shalt meet a company of prophets; and they shall prophesy: and the Spirit of the Lord will come upon thee, and thou shalt prophesy with them, and shalt be turned into another man.

When he prophesied among the prophets, the people said, Is Saul also among the phophets?

And Samuel called the people together, and they went to Gilgal and made Saul king before the Lord.

Samuel said to Saul, Thus saith the Lord, I remember what Amalek did to Israel. Now go and smite Amalek, and destroy all that they have. And Saul smote the Amalekites, and took Agag the king of the Amalekites alive, and spared the best of the sheep, and of the oxen. And Samuel came to Saul, and Saul said, I have performed the commandment of the Lord. And Samuel said, What meaneth then the bleating of the sheep, and the lowing of the oxen which I hear? And Saul said, They have spared

the best of the sheep and of the oxen, to sacrifice unto the Lord. And Samuel said, Hath the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in opeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice. For rebellion is as the sin of witchcraft, and subbornness is as iniquity and idolatry. Because thou hast rejected the word of the Lord, he hath also rejected thee from being king.

And Saul said unto Samuel, I have sinned: for I have transgressed the commandment of the Lord, and thy words: because I feared the people, and obeyed their voice. Now therefore, I pray thee, pardon my sin. And he laid hold upon the skirt of his mantle, and it rent. And Samuel said unto him, The Lord hath rent the kingdom of Israel from thee this day, and hath given it to a neighbor of thine, that is better than thou. And Samuel came no more to see Saul until the day of his death: nevertheless Samuel mourned for Saul.

The Lord said unto Samuel, How long wilt thou mourn for Saul, seeing I have rejected him? I will send thee to Jesse the Bethlehemite: for I have provided me a king among his sons, And Samuel looked on Eliab, and said, Surely the Lord's anointed is

But the Lord said, I have refused him: for the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh upon the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh upon the heart.
