

Bearcats Down Pioneers For 3rd Conference Win

WU Registers 69-57 Triumph

Ted Loder Leads Way With 26 Counters

Willamette university's sophomore-laden Bearcats racked up their third straight win in Northwest conference play by turning back Lewis and Clark's Pioneers 69-57 on the WU floor Friday night. The two teams met again tonight at the L&C court in Portland at 8 o'clock.

Pacing the Bearcat victory Friday was Ted Loder, forward from Milwaukie, who collected 26 points and played a flawless floor game. His defense was on the sensational side at times, too.

Lewis and Clark's consistent ace, gigantic Bob Pollard, collected a dozen tallies before he fouled out of the game with five minutes of the second half played.

The game was a see-saw battle for 15 minutes of the first half. Then, with Lewis and Clark possessing a 27-26 lead, Willamette embarked upon a hot streak to carry them into a 40-32 halftime advantage.

The visitors from Portland never managed to catch the 'Cats in the second half. The closest they came was 44-41 with 13 minutes left to go.

Then Hugh Bellinger dribbled into the basket and connected with a layup. Fouled on the shot, he stepped to the free throw line and added a bonus marker. Loder hooked in a couple of points from the side to put Willamette out front 49-41.

But the Pioneers weren't out of the running yet. Ed Paul rammed in a layup and Jack Henry sank a gifter to close the gap to 49-44, and Lewis and Clark was still in striking distance.

Willamette built its lead up to ten points, 56-46, with a brief rally. Chuck Gengler sneaked in a single point for Lewis and Clark, then Loder canned one from the corner for Willamette, and Lou Scrivens added another pair of Bearcat markers and Johnny Lewis' crew had the game in the bag, 60-47.

Lewis used reserves extensively in the closing minutes of the ball game. Standing out among the 'Cat reserves was Chuck Robinson, who accounted for four field goals and a trio of free throws for 11 points. Top scorer for the losers was Rod Downey, who started at one of the guard slots. Downey scored 13 markers.

Both teams played an aggressive type of ball the entire 40 minutes. Hal Chase totaled a total of 40 instructions, 22 on Lewis and Clark and 18 against the Bearcats, not a high figure for a fast, hard-fought battle.

How Code Operates:

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—Here are the main provisions of the National Collegiate Athletic association's sanity code, adopted two years ago:

1. Athletes shall be admitted to the institution on the same basis as other students and shall be required to maintain the same academic standards.
2. Financial aids may be given athletes only (a) if awarded on the basis of need by the regular agency for giving aid to all students; (b) if awarded on the basis of high scholarship; (c) if awarded on the basis of qualifications of which athletic ability is not one.
3. No institution shall solicit any prospective athlete with an offer of financial aid.
4. Compensation of an athlete for employment shall be commensurate with the service rendered.
5. An athlete may be given incidental benefits such as medical attention and meals while on sanctioned trips and one meal a day during practice periods on the home campus.

Newly organized committees of the Big Ten and Pacific Coast conference met to discuss renewal of the Rose Bowl football series pact which expires after next year. Victor O'Schmidt, PCC commissioner, said no definite action was taken.

The two leagues may sign a long-time contract this year, possibly for ten years. Kenneth (Tug) Wilson, commissioner of the Big Ten, favors such an arrangement.

The large television panel accepted a recommendation of the Eastern College Athletic conference that an active television committee be appointed immediately by the NCAA. This committee would make a thorough investigation on the impact of television on college athletics.

The television committee of the ECAC said it had "come to the conclusion that television is a potential threat to the financial structure of college athletics."

The recommendation, which goes before the full convention tomorrow, urged the NCAA recommend to its members no TV commitments be made beyond the 1950-51 college year.

Leib, a mild little Iowan who spearheaded the sanity code's adoption two years ago, spoke before a combined meeting of the NCAA and football coaches after an emergency prevented the appearance of Gen. Dwight (Ike) Eisenhower, Columbia president, who was to make the main talk.

The NCAA executive warned that tomorrow's meeting would decide the future of the organization.

"We will decide if we're going to have effective administration of sports or if we're going to lower the bars and let the sky be the limit," he declared.

Waldorf Heads Grid Coaches

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf of California was elected president of the American Football Coaches Association today to succeed L. R. (Dutch) Meyer of Texas Christian university.

At the same time, the coaches decided to hold their meeting next year in Dallas in connection with the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association sessions.

Tuss McLaughry of Dartmouth was reelected secretary-treasurer of the coaches association. The following officers also were named: Lloyd Jordan of Amherst, first vice president; Carl Snavely of North Carolina, second vice president; and Don Faurot of Missouri, third vice president.

\$50,000 'Cap Slated Today

ARCADIA, Calif., Jan. 13 (AP)—It's Ladies day at Santa Anita race track tomorrow, as eight of the country's top fillies and mares compete in the 13th running of the \$50,000 Santa Margarita handicap.

The best of the field looks to be Two Lea, Calumet Farm's current leading lady of the turf. The Morning Line will probably show her at 6-5.

A big factor is today's driving sun, which is expected to turn the racing strip into good condition—if not fast—by tomorrow afternoon. The 4-year-old Two Lea, who hasn't been out of the money in her career, has never raced in the mud. She'll be carrying top weight of 126 pounds.
