The conference program will get under way at 11 a.m., January 24, (following registration at 10 a.m.) with a general assembly directed by L. J. Allen, state agent of 4-H club work.

Delegates will hear from Miss Emmie Nelson, of Chicago, field representative, national committee on boys and girls club work, on Wednesday morning when she presents the topic, "What Makes Good 4-H Leadership." "You Can Bank on This," by Elwin Greenwood, secretary of the Oregon Bankers' association, concludes the Wednesday morning program. Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall, professor of family life education at Oregon State college, will speak to the group on, "What Makes Them Tick," which will be followed by a discussion before the delegates break up into project interest groups to conclude the afternoon's program.

Thursday morning is devoted to group meetings centered around specific projects depending on the delegates' interests.

H. C. Seymour, 4-H Club consultant, of the Triangle Milling company, Portland, will close the conference with, "How Can We Strengthen Our 4-H Club Work," followed by a discussion. The conference will close with a noon luncheon on Thursday, January 26.
