General 4-H Club Session Set at St. Paul

Organization of 4-H clubs and discussions of 4-H projects will be featured at a general meeting to be held at St. Paul's high school at 8 p. m. tonight, reports Anthol Riney, Marion county extension agent, 4-H.

The boys and girls of club age 9-18 have been contacted at the three schools by Riney previously and found considerable interest among these groups on some of the various projects.

The meeting is open to the public and Riney would like the parents of interested and prospective members to be present with their children.

For the clubs to be organized, each will be led by an adult local leader from the community. At present Charles Pellard, St. Paul, has agreed to work with a group of the older boys in the new 4-H tractor maintenance project. F. L. Zielinski, prominent swine breeder, will lead a pig club.

After talking with the various groups Riney anticipates the need for leaders in the following projects: dairy, poultry, clothing, cooking and possibly others in addition to the previously mentioned projects with leaders already contacted. The St. Paul branch, Commercial Bank of Newberg, has offered the services of their fieldman William Kletzer to help get leaders and club members together.

Riney points out that already enrolled for the 1950 club year are some 1875 4-H members here in Marion county. To date these are carrying 2615 different projects. Of course Health leads the list with 61 clubs and 1451 members. Clothing is next with 49 clubs and 447 members, then cooking projects with 36 clubs and 367 members.

Dairy Co-op Association Meet To Stress Farm Management

Better farm management is to be urged at today's meeting of the Dairy Cooperative association in Mayflower hall.

A greater emphasis on efficiency is the dairy farmer's best safeguard against changing economy, report the sponsors of the program. Dairy farmers are facing changing economic conditions, just as all farmer enterprises are doing. It has never been more important

to consider the best means of protecting yourself against any undesirable results that these changes may bring, reports the Co-op Dairy News issued Sunday.

The costs of operating a dairy farm remain high. Many of them are fixed and cannot be reduced to any great extent. Taxes, for instance, are the highest in history, the co-op bulletin points out. The price of an hour's labor both on the farm and in industry is higher than ever before. Farm machinery, repair costs, and maintenance costs never go down as fast as the goods a farmer sells. In addition, transportation costs are still rising.

Good management is the only answer left. A watchful eye on new research and improved breeding will keep the dairymen among the more stable of farming enterprises, a position it has always held, the bulletin continues.

Cool water and plenty of it increases milk production, dairymen report. Water also causes a cow to eat more feed, and therefore produce more milk. This is important in winter as well as summer.

CIO Advocates Legislation Creating CVA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Enactment of legislation creating a Columbia Valley Authority was urged today by the CIO.

A pamphlet was issued by the labor organization showing pictures of timber and water resources of the area and urging that their development be coordinated under a CVA as called for by President Truman.

"The CIO stands for the common sense development of all of the resources of the Pacific Northwest under a sensible, balanced plan," says the pamphlet, entitled "The Magnificent Columbia."

"It is fighting against the piecemeal development which has wrecked the resources of other regions."

Expressing its opposition to exploitation of the area by "ruthless monopolistic combines interested only in their own profit," the pamphlet said:

"The resources belong to the people of the valley, and the people of America. They were not put there for the benefit of the privately-owned power companies, the timber interests, the army engineers or the reclamation bureau."
