

Mine Cave-In Rescue Party Still Digging

MAHANOCY CITY, Pa., Jan. 16 (AP)—Inch by inch, weary rescue workers dug deeper into the jumbled debris of an anthracite mine today clinging to a fading hope of finding, still alive, a 25-year-old miner buried in a cave-in Friday.

Chances of Edward Burda's survival 120 feet underground are one in a hundred, veteran miners admit. But the dogged and dangerous search for him goes on, every worker remembering that Burda's brother Joseph, 30, was rescued early Sunday.

Clawing at the rock and coal with compressed air drills, picks and even their bare fingers, the rescuers were making painfully slow headway. The hole inched deeper at a rate at times only one foot in five hours.

The diggers were driving a three-foot shaft at a 60-degree angle into broad mountain, where the five Burda brothers operate a small independent mine.

About 18 feet from the bottom of the 120-foot mine the rescue workers found the end of a rope which they thought was attached to a mine car used by Burda.

They believed they might be able to reach him by tonight or early tomorrow as they made faster progress in the anthracite formation. Progress was stepped up to about two feet an hour from one foot.

Three of the brothers were working in the mine Friday when the earth tumbled down on them. Casimir, 32, was engulfed by the slide but wriggled free. Joseph, who had heard an earlier, smaller, slide and ran to aid Edward, was trapped at the 5-foot level.

Casimir literally jumped out of his shoes and scrambled to safety. It was he who summoned help and began the rescue efforts.

Extension of
Oil Pipeline to
West Speeded

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 16 (AP)—Two contracts for extension of the Salt Lake Pipeline company's oil products line to the northwest were awarded today.

C. E. Finney, jr., president, said the new work will extend the line from Boise, Idaho, to Pasco, Wash. The section from Boise to Baker, Ore., will be built by Morrison-Knudsen Company, Inc., the Macco corporation and the Betchel corporation, Finney said.

The northern portion of the line, from Baker to Pasco, Wash., will be built by Pacific Pipeline and Engineers, Ltd.

Construction will begin as soon as weather permits in the spring, Finney said.

The new installation will extend by 240 miles the line which was begun last year to carry petroleum products from Salt Lake City to Boise, Idaho. The first leg, to twin falls, Idaho, was opened to service early this month.

The pipeline firm and the Salt Lake Refinery company, which will supply products to be moved via the line, both are subsidiaries of the Standard Oil company of California.

Portland AFL Council Approves Resolution Rapping M&F Move

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—The AFL Central Labor council tonight approved resolutions declaring a recent cancellation of advertising by Meier & Frank company was an attack on the principle of a free press.

The labor organization's executive board protested any attempt that has been made or may be made by the Meier & Frank company or any other commercial firm or business to "force or influence" publication of news by financial coercion.

Another resolution, offered by AFL web pressmen, said "if a newspaper is to function properly it is morally bound to publish all news of interest in the community it serves. If it fails in its responsibility it fails in its duty to the public and fails in its duty to the advertiser."

The press workers said "when a newspaper yields to such pressure it becomes an instrument of hypocrisy and forfeits its constitutional rights of freedom of the press."

The newspaper's general manager, M. J. Frey, announced last week that quantities of advertising already scheduled had been cancelled by the Portland department store without explanation after publication of a national labor relations board decision against the store. The NLRB had found the store guilty of violating the National Labor law in its relations with an AFL union attempting to organize the office workers.

Weather Adds
To Welfare
Need in County

Continued severe weather has added to the already serious welfare situation in Marion county, Administrator Marion Bowen indicated Monday in announcing that \$126,400 is the budget sought for February, slightly above that of January.

She doubted that this month's \$25,000 for general assistance would last the full month.

The weather also prevented convening of Monday's regular session of the county welfare commission. It will be set for a later date.

The \$1,200 increase sought for February is in the old age assistance and aid to dependent children categories. Approval must come from the state welfare commission, which provides a percentage of aid funds.

Jobs and food are still the priority items for many families caught between seasonal work and after a year in which seasonal earnings were low. If general assistance funds run out, food provisions will be diminished as they were in November and December.

Civil War Vet 107 Years Old At Oregon City

OREGON CITY, Ore., Jan. 16 (AP)—Michael Joseph Thralls celebrated his 107th birthday today and remarked that Abraham Lincoln was the best president this country ever had.

It was logical that he should think so, for Thralls enlisted with the Union army from his home of Vigo county, Indiana, and served in the civil war under General Pat Thomas.

He was wounded, too: hit in the shoulder during the second battle of Nashville in 1864.

Neither the wound, nor anything else in his 107 years has daunted Thralls much. He still smokes a pipe, and still moves about actively in the home he shares with his grandson, Kenneth F. Morton.

He's a little old fashioned about some things, though. "Rather ride on the back of a long-horn Texas steer than in an airplane," he said.

The centennarian, who came here recently from Nampa, Ida., attributes his longevity to eating corn bread and cabbage and smoking a pipe. "The pipe of peace," he called it.

He's been widowed twice. "Might even get married again," he joked, "if I could find a wife who'd fill my pipe and smoke with me."

Final Services Scheduled for Gen. Arnold

SONOMA, Calif., Jan. 16 (AP)—Folks in the Valley of the Moon will bid goodbye tomorrow to a big, friendly neighbor they knew as "Hap" Arnold.

The nation, led by President Truman, will pay final respects to General of the Air Force Henry H. Arnold Thursday at the Arlington National cemetery, resting ground of fighting men and heroes.

The wartime commander of the army air forces died yesterday at his Rancho Feliz (Happy ranch) home 40 miles north of San Francisco. A heart ailment caused his death. He was 63.

General Arnold's body will lie in state from 11:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. tomorrow in the chapel of the Bates and Evans mortuary here. An air force honor guard stood watch today.

The body will be flown to Washington and placed in the chapel at nearby Fort Myer, Va. Funeral services will be held at 3 p. m. Thursday at Arlington. President Truman arranged to attend the last rites for the pioneer military aviator.

Mr. Truman sent his own plane to Hamilton Field, 20 miles south of Sonoma, to pick up the Arnold family. It is due to return to Washington at 8 a. m. Wednesday, two hours after the plane bearing General Arnold's remains.

Three sons of the retired five-star general arrived at Rancho Feliz to be at Mrs. Arnold's side. Lt. David L. Arnold came from March Field, Calif.; Col. Henry H. Arnold, jr., from Fort Leavenworth, Kas.; and Capt. William B. Arnold from Banana River, Fla. A daughter, Lois, wife of Navy Cmdr. Ernest Snowden, lives at Corpus Christi, Tex.

Russia to Open
Concentration
Camp Gates

BERLIN, Jan. 16 (AP)—Russia announced tonight that she is washing her hands of all concentration camps in eastern Germany where at least 29,649 prisoners are being held.

Fifteen thousand will be turned loose at once, but 14,000 will be turned over to the East German government.

Gen. Vassily Chuikov, chief of the Soviet control commission, in a letter to Acting Prime Minister Walter Ulbricht of the East German government named three former Nazi concentration camps where Soviet administration will be liquidated. They were Buchenwald, Sachsenhausen and Bautzen. The letter, carried by the Soviet-licensed news agency ADN, was dated Jan. 14.

The Russians never have admitted the existence of concentration camps in eastern Germany. They called them internment camps.

Presbyterian Moderator Due at Oregon Meeting

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—Dr. Clifford E. Barbour, moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian churches of the nation, will speak at the annual Oregon Presbyterian meeting here Thursday.

His address will be delivered at an open meeting at the Mt. Tabor Presbyterian church at 8 p.m.

Top Democrat Asks \$3 Billion Budget Slash

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—A top democrat called today for a \$3,000,000,000 slash in President Truman's budget, and republicans launched a drive for a "quickie" bill to cut excise taxes by over \$600,000,000 a year.

Simultaneously, House GOP Leader Martin charged that a "state of confusion" among the president's tax advisors had delayed transmittal of administration tax-cutting plans to congress.

The proposal for a reduction in Mr. Truman's \$43,439,000,000 budget came from Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the senate finance committee. He called for government economy to erase over one-half of the anticipated \$5,000,000,000 deficit next year.

A new delay in Mr. Truman's tax measure to congress caused wide speculation on Capitol Hill. Charles G. Ross, the president's press secretary, said this morning the tax message probably would be sent to Capitol Hill late this week. Previously it had been indicated the message might be ready early in the week.

Five Percenter Probers to Slap Gen. Vaughan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—The senate committee which investigated "five percenters" reportedly is about ready to issue a "rather severe rebuke" to Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, President Truman's army aide.

The committee's report on last summer's inquiry is expected, to be made public later this week.

One official who has seen the document told a reporter the section dealing with Vaughan amounts "to a rather severe rebuke, as far as I am concerned."

Another said the report contains "a pretty vigorous criticism" of Vaughan.

Both officials asked that their names not be used.

The senate inquiry dealt with the activities of men who collected a fee for helping others get government contracts. Because the fee often was five per cent of the proceeds, the probe became known as the five percenter investigation.

There is nothing illegal about collecting such fees. The committee was trying to find out whether improper influence had figured in the handling of government business.

During the public hearings, Vaughan's name popped up frequently. The committee was told that the presidential aide several times intervened at government agencies in behalf of friends.

Mao Pays Visit To Leningrad

LONDON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Chinese communist chief Mao Tse-tung has just paid a flying visit to Leningrad, the Moscow radio said tonight.

The radio, which did not mention the reason for Mao's trip, said he arrived in the Baltic city yesterday and returned to Moscow today.

Mao came to Moscow to help celebrate Prime Minister Stalin's birthday and has remained to negotiate new agreements between Russia and communist China.
