CHICAGO, Jan. 17 -(AP)- Grains held firm in today's board of trade session on short covering and some commercial buying. Cash houses bought during the early part of the session and observers said this was traceable to overnight sales of flour to domestic buyers.

Other grains followed the lead of wheat and at the close wheat was 3% to 1/2 cent higher, corn was 1/4 to 5/8 higher, oats were unchanged to 3/8 higher, rye was 3/4 to 1¼ higher, soybeans were unchanged to 1/2 higher and lard was 2 to 15 cents a hundredweight higher.







