City Officials Defended Over The Dalles 'Hot Cargo' Riot

The labor riots at The Dalles over the unloading of a pineapple barge last September cannot be laid at the feet of The Dalles city officials, according to George P. Stadelman, operator of a produce and packing concern there.

Stadelman said that officers at The Dalles agreed to permit unloading of the barge from Hawaii only after American Federation of Labor officials said they would haul the unloaded pineapple to its destination in northern California.

The president of the Stadelman Fruit company outlined the entire situation for members of the Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon in the Marion hotel. The barge left Hawaii during the strike of CIO longshoremen against the waterfront employers which began last summer.

Its original destination was San Francisco, but when it reached there it was declared "hot" and so proceeded to Puget Sound. According to Stadelman's report, the AF of L representative at The Dalles refused to unload the cargo, for fear of CIO "retaliation," but agreed to haul it.

It was stated at that time, said Stadelman, that there were no labor dispute between the pineapple company and its employees or between the company and AF of L.

The disputed cargo arrived at The Dalles on September 23 and then, said Stadelman, "AF of L spokesmen began to issue conflicting reports as to whether the union would haul the pineapple." When the four trucks arrived to haul the fruit one of them was driven by an AF of L member who had been cleared by union officials at San Francisco and at Portland.

Then came the unloading operations and trouble. "A mob" rushed the trucks and dock area, smashed trucks and windows, beat up drivers, smashed newsman's cameras and indulged in other acts of violence.

Port officials halted the unloading operations, 24 of the mobsters were indicted, and 10 days later unloading operations began again. Stadelman said that four of those engaged in the rioting had been identified by FBI officials as being communists.

Oregon was second among six states involved in the survey with a \$75,681,415 total. Washington topped the list with \$171,804,842.

"Thrifting is a word that has been dropped from vocabularies of far too many persons," McKay said Tuesday as national thrift week, honoring the birthday of Benjamin Franklin, began throughout the nation.

"Thrifting is basic in all material growth," McKay said. "Therefore it is fitting that we respect the birthday of Benjamin Franklin, who was born 244 years ago today, and who so aptly has been called the Father of Thrift."

"I heartily endorse the National Thrift Committee's 1950 program and commend the following points to the people of Oregon: regular savings from every pay-check; planned spending from a sensible budget; payment of debts promptly and faithfully; anticipation of expenses by setting aside funds from every pay check; home ownership as a form of a goal for savings; insurance to protect against life's uncertainties; and U. S. savings bonds purchased and held to maturity."

"I urge the citizens of Oregon to adopt this savings program and to resolve anew this National Thrift week to safeguard future security and the economic stability of our nation by making thrift a rule of conduct throughout 1950."

Russians Walk Again from Japan Council

TOKYO, Wednesday, Jan. 18. (AP) The Russians took another walk today from the four-power allied council for Japan. It was the third time in six weeks the Soviets had left rather than discuss their failure to complete repatriation of Japanese war prisoners.

The pattern of the Russian exit was the same at the council meetings of December 20 and January 4 when the repatriation issue was on the agenda.

Lt. Gen. Kuzma Derevyanko, the Soviet delegate, said: "For reasons stated earlier and which are known to the members of the allied council, I don't think it is possible to take part in the discussion of the subject on today's agenda."

Thereupon, he rose and led his five assistants from the crowded chamber.

American officials have said 376,000 Japanese war prisoners still unaccounted for by the Soviet may be presumed to have died in Russian hands or still are held in Soviet camps.
