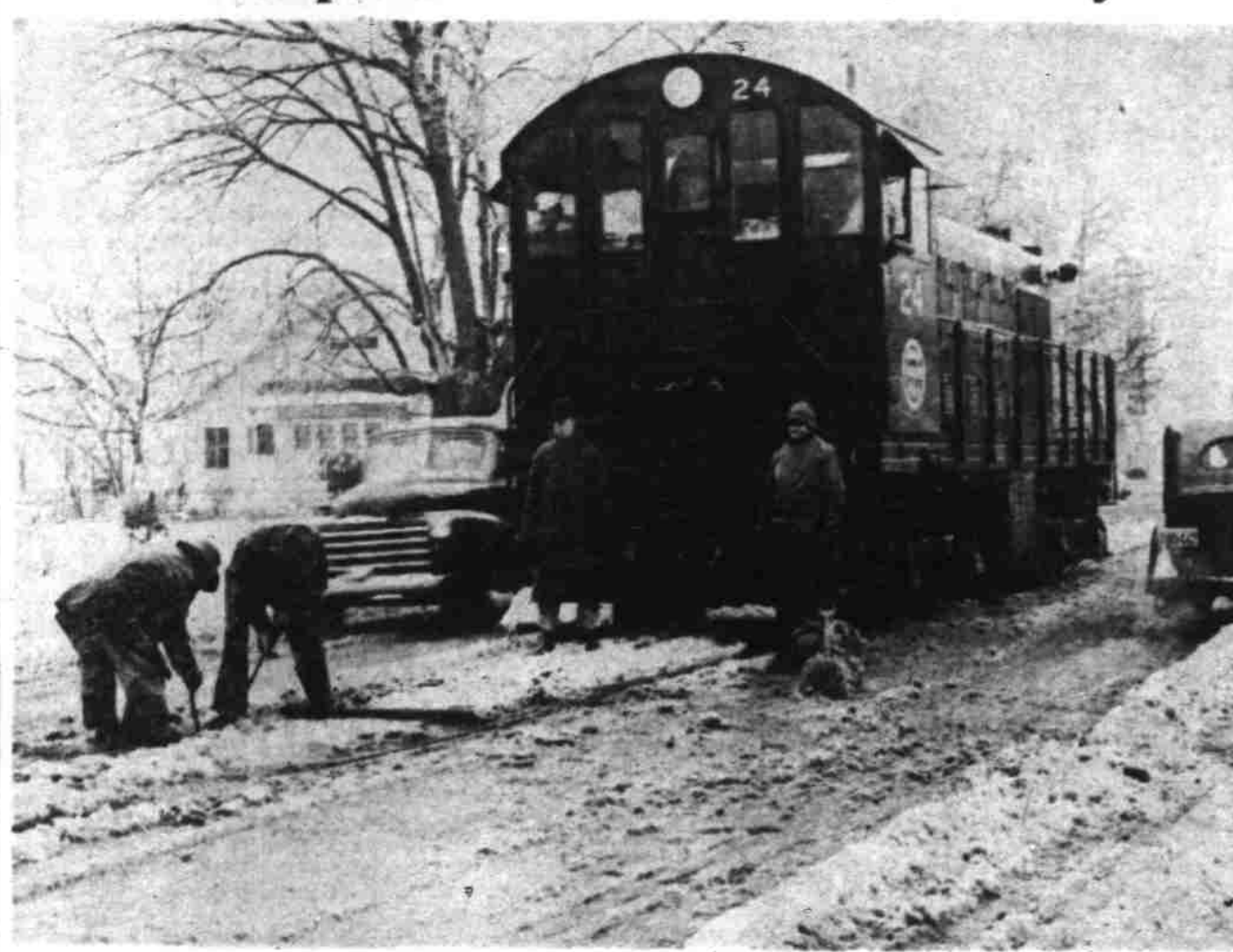

Donald Walker Contends CVA 'Anti-Liberal'

"There's nothing 'liberal' about proposed legislation for a Columbia Valley administration," averred Portland attorney Donald C. Walker in an anti-CVA address Thursday before Salem Lions club. Introduced as a potential candidate for the republican congressional nomination in Portland's district, Walker declared the CVA bill now under consideration would mean more centralization of government and less individual liberty and dignity.

Program Chairman George Rhoten intimated in his introduction that Walker might oppose U. S. Rep. Homer Angell for nomination this May. Walker himself said he had not made up his mind. He has been prominent in young republican circles.

The speaker opposed CVA on grounds that "it would be a departure from constitutional government." He asserted, "As a corporation not dependent on congress for appropriations, CVA would be a definite step away from representative government."

Walker criticized what he called "the ambiguous wording" of the bill and the "lack of standards and boundaries which must be expressed to establish new law."

Colored Oleo Ban Also Due To State Law

Repeal of the federal excise taxes on colored oleomargarine won't mean that Oregon housewives will be able to buy colored oleo.

Oregon state law has prohibited the sale of colored oleo since 1915. Attempts have been made in the legislature to allow sale of colored oleo in Oregon, but they have been badly defeated.

In the most recent legislature, in 1949, democrats sponsored a bill to permit sale of colored oleo. But it was defeated 22 to 6 in the senate. The house never considered the bill.

Generally, the democratic legislators from Portland want to let colored oleo be sold. But the republican legislators from upstate dairy communities, who have an overwhelming control, are against oleo.

Armored Car Service Due In Salem Soon

Salem merchants can breathe easier in the near future when Frank Grimm, veteran law officer, puts the Salem Armored Car service in operation.

Grimm arrived in Salem from Denver, Colo., Thursday with a bullet-proof armored car to be used exclusively in this area. He said the service would be started soon for merchants.

Local merchants have been without an armored pickup service since last spring when a Portland firm discontinued operations in Salem. Since then they have carried daily receipts to the bank without armed protection except when city police escorted persons carrying large sums.

Grimm, who lives at 145 S. 14th st., retired from the state police Sept. 20, 1949, after serving since 1931 as a sergeant at The Dalles and as assistant identification bureau director at Salem headquarters.

Prior to joining the state police he was a special agent for the Union Pacific railroad at The Dalles from 1926 to 1931.

"I decided to start the armored car service," Grimm said, "because of the acute need for the protection in Salem. I intend to make the service reasonable enough to permit small businesses as well as the large ones to use it."

Salem Police Chief Clyde Warren endorsed the service as "a needed protection for Salem businesses and an aid to the local police department."

Grimm said the armored car is protected by armor plate throughout and bullet-proof glass. He and an assistant will be armed with sawed-off shot guns and sidearms while making pickups and deliveries of money.
