

Safeway Denied Right to Sell Lucerne Brand Milk in Salem

PORTLAND, Jan. 19—(AP)—The state milk marketing administrator today denied Safeway Stores, Inc., the right to put its own brand of milk on the Salem market.

An appeal to the state supreme court by Safeway seemed certain. Safeway had applied for permission to buy milk from the Salem dairy area, process it at Safeway's Lucerne plant in Portland, then sell it at Salem Safeway stores. It was to have been 3.8 per cent butterfat milk in paper containers at state minimum prices.

Two Salem distributors, the Dairy Co-operative association and Curley's dairy, opposed the application. They admitted they did not want competition from Safeway's richer milk. They have been charging a half-cent premium for 3.5 per cent milk in paper containers.

Threat to Dairies
Milk Administrator Thomas L. Ohlsen said Safeway's proposal to expand threatened the survival of other Salem dairies. The competition might cut the business of other dairies and so increase their costs. It might also throw a disproportionate share of the cost of carrying surplus milk on other producers, he said.

"Circumstances that could possibly result in higher consumer or lower producer prices would not be in the public interest at this time," Ohlsen said.

A statement by C. H. Bartlett, Safeway division manager, accused Ohlsen of "fostering a milk monopoly."

'Fail to Understand'
"Safeway has asked for nothing the administrator has not already allowed others to do. We fail to understand how Oregon's milk czar can let Salem-processed milk be sold on other markets but refuse to allow Salem-produced milk to be sold there. It is because it happens our processing plant is in Portland. When the administrator forces Salem producers to sell their milk only to certain Salem distributors, what is he doing but fostering a milk monopoly?" the statement said.

Ohlsen indicated he intends to protect distributors in up-state markets from the state petition. He said distributors other than Safeway have expressed interest in expanding to other areas and that such expansion "might have serious and far-reaching effects" on upstate dairies.

Johnny Mann, Test Pilot, Dies In Plane Crash

CHIPLEY, Fla., Jan. 19—(AP)—Johnny Mann, cross country flier and famed test pilot, and a friend plunged to their death out of a star-light sky last midnight. Preliminary investigation was unable to explain why the plane went down.

Mann was returning to his Los Angeles home from an unsuccessful attempt to set a new non-stop Los Angeles-to-Miami light plane record.

He had to give up on his try for the record Saturday when his fuel ran low near Jacksonville, Fla. He went on, however, to Miami for the all-American air maneuvers.

Dying with Mann on a plowed field northwest of Chipley was Deputy Sheriff Robert E. Milander, 42, of Los Angeles.

On the return trip via Jacksonville, the 45-year-old test pilot was carrying a message of good will and commendation from Miami Mayor William M. Wolfarth to Mayor Fletcher Boynton of Los Angeles.

The aircraft hooked a wheel on a low fence surrounding the field and smashed into the plowed earth, digging a two-foot hole in the ground.

Florida highway patrolmen, who joined with sheriff's officers and civil aeronautics authority investigators in probing the wreckage, said weather was clear at the time of the crash, and fireways beacons were flashing distinctly. No distress messages were reported.

Identification was established from a press clipping in Mann's pocket. The clipping said his 2,110-mile flight to Jacksonville at an average speed of 177 miles an hour set a light plane record.

Railroads Supply Descriptive Word

PHILADELPHIA—(INS)—The scholars whose nod puts a new word into the dictionary—may soon have another to add officially to the language.

It's "dieselize," a word being used with increasing frequency to describe the action of many of the nation's railroads in replacing worn-out steam locomotives with new diesel-electric units.

"In the last 10 years, more than 6,500 oil-burning locomotives have gone into service, a jump of nearly 1800 per cent in this type of tractive power," explains R. H. DeMott, vice president of SKF Industries, Inc. "The amount of steam power, on the other hand, has declined 20 per cent."

The SKF official, whose firm pioneered the use of anti-friction bearings on both types of locomotives, said the rate at which diesel-electrics are going into service will be even greater in the next few years.

"Of 833 locomotives now on order, 812 are diesel-electric units," he added. "Long-range operating economies more than offset the high initial cost of these engines which are priced anywhere from \$100,000 to \$600,000."

Truman Denies Authorizing Denham Action

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19—(AP)—President Truman said today that he had nothing to do with Robert Denham's injunction suit against John Lewis and that he himself will step into the coal situation when it becomes necessary.

But he asserted, as he has on several previous occasions, that there is no national emergency now requiring presidential intervention.

Thus he replied to an insistent clamor from congress members and others who insist that the mid-winter coal shortage caused by Lewis' three-day week and the intermittent strikes in the coal fields constitute an emergency.

Mr. Truman said that Denham, general counsel of the national labor relations board, told him in advance of the suit filed yesterday in an effort to halt the three-day week. But the president said the White House had nothing to do with the suit.

Denham acted under the Taft-Hartley act contending that Lewis was employing unfair labor practices to force operators to sign a contract containing illegal features.

Mr. Truman also has been urged to seek an injunction banning the shortened work schedule under a section of the act dealing with the general welfare. He told reporters today that he is in constant touch with the supply situation. He'll take action when developments make it necessary, he added.

Mr. Truman said there is a difference between the subject of an emergency and the questions raised by Denham in the NLRB petition which has been set for federal court hearing next Thursday. Some lawmakers have expressed doubt that the Denham suit would force full coal production even though it might alter some of the Lewis contract demands, if the court accepted Denham's view.

In seven states, 90,000 miners were on strike—almost one-fourth of the soft coal working force, and a coal mine dynamiting added to the growing tension of the eight-month contract deadlock.
