

Long-Time SP Worker Retires At Jefferson

JEFFERSON — John Alexander is enjoying a two weeks vacation from his work with the Southern Pacific section crew here, and plans to retire sometime during the last of the month. He started working for the railroad in 1905, and off and on, has worked for them for 38 years.

Alexander is the only son of Dr. W. F. Alexander and Estella Jane Walter Alexander, Oregon pioneers. He was born at Peter's Butte near Lebanon on January 5, 1885, and has lived most of his life in this community. For many years he cared for his mother, who died in December of 1944 at the age of 88. He has been a member of the IOOF and Rebekah lodges since 1920 and has gone through the Oddfellow chairs twice.

When asked what he planned to do when retired, he said he hoped to keep busy doing odd jobs about town. He is in good health and looks many years younger than his 65 years.

Stock Market

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. (AP)—A rallying stock market made fresh progress today despite the losses taken in an afternoon decline. A good day's business was done. The trading tempo hit a faster pace when prices advanced and slowed on the decline. Turnover of 1,440,000 shares compared with 1,170,000 Thursday. Prices moved up, usually in halting fashion, through the morning. In the afternoon buyers were considerably less energetic and quotations started a slow downward march. Gains were either chopped down a bit or even converted into losses with the major exception of packing house stocks. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 2 of one point to 73. The rail section made the best showing, mainly because of gains scored by Great Northern and Nickel Plate. Industrials and utilities, on average, improved slightly. The market was a bit broader than yesterday with 1,110 individual stocks bought and sold. Of these 459 showed gains and 368 were marked down.

Major Grains Hold Steady in Quiet Session

CHICAGO, Jan. 20. (AP)—While major grains held steady in quiet dealings, weakness cropped up in soybean prices on the board of trade today. Both sold off on general liquidating movement toward the close. In wheat, corn and oats trends were highly confused. Prices swung up and down rather easily on small volume. These cereals never developed a definite trend and ended with prices scrambled. Wheat ended 1/8 lower to 3/8 higher, corn was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, soybeans were 1/4-1/2 lower and hard was unchanged to 10 cents a hundred pounds higher. Selling in wheat came mainly from commission houses and local traders. Hedging was very light. Export houses gave the market a little support by lifting bids and against a sale of two cargoes of wheat to Holland and one to Great Britain.
