House Number Ordinance on Council Docket

Integration of house numbers from Salem's annexations in Polk county, as well as aiding the assignment of future numbers of the city, is provided in an ordinance bill being prepared for introduction to Salem city council Monday at 7:30 p.m. in city hall. "Very few changes" would be necessitated by the ordinance, according to City Engineer J. Harold Davis.

Street numbers in the former city of West Salem are in conformity with the Salem system, according to Davis. The bill will continue Edgewater street and Wallace road as the base lines from which numbering originates.

In the Kingwood Heights area, the wandering ways of streets make systematizing difficult, but officials said little change from present numbers is contemplated. The bill, being drafted Saturday by City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz, would extend, in general, the present arrangement for assignment of numbers to new buildings, but would increase the authority of the city building inspector to determine the numbers.

Meanwhile, the city engineer's office is progressing with the task of assigning numbers to property in all newly annexed areas on the city fringe, as well as correcting a few errors in present situations.

Reserve Units Slate 2 Weeks Field Training

Two of Salem's army reserve units, the 369th engineer boat and shore regiment and the 409th quartermasters, will take two weeks of field training from April 30 to May 14.

The schedule calls for the training to take place at Fort Worden, Wash., but local officers said plans might be changed. They said inclement weather at Fort Worden often hampers adequate training. The 369th is commanded by Col. George Spaur and consists of 35 men and officers. Lt. Col. Homer Lyon, jr., commands the 409th and about 16 men are expected to attend the camp. Both units are part of the 409th engineer special brigade, with headquarters in Los Angeles, Calif.

Korea Student to Leave Salem; 'Thanks' Given for Hospitality

Appreciation to Salem residents for kindness and for helping him to learn about democracy was expressed Saturday by a former Korean diplomat who has studied at Willamette university the past two years and is to leave for the east this week for more study. Byung Choll Koh, who has been widely known here as "Ben," expects to be in the United States for about three more years before returning to his country's diplomatic service.

On a scholarship, Koh has completed work here for his bachelor's degree in political science, including his oral and comprehensive examinations during the past week. Now he will leave for Washington, D.C., to work for his master's degree at George Washington university. After that he hopes to try for a doctorate.

Oregon-Born Wife

Then he will go back to South Korea, where his father is leader of the republican party. Going with him will be his Oregon-born wife, Ruby, who plans to be a teacher. Now a receptionist at Fairview home, Mrs. Koh will remain in Salem for the present. When she joins Koh in the east, she will take schooling in education. Her parents were born in Korea and now reside at Gresham, but Mrs. Koh has never been to Korea.

The 26-year-old student has recently received from his parents several hand-made articles, including boxes inlaid with mother-of-pearl and embroidered wall hangings, being sold through First National bank branch here to extend the Kohs' stringent financing. Due to exchange difficulties, his parents can send no money.

Koh was in the diplomatic service and aiding U.S. military government in Japan after the war for about two years, when called back to Korea by U.S. and native leaders to take the scholarship for American study. Earlier, during the war, he had been in espionage activities in Manchuria and had narrowly escaped capture by the Japanese.

'Many Kind Favors'

Koh's statement of gratitude said: "During my two years here I have received many kind favors and considerations from the people of Salem, and I sincerely regret having to leave Willamette."

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Employment Advisory Council To Suggest Community Studies

Emphasizing community cooperation, studies for development of more jobs to relieve seasonal and long range unemployment will be inaugurated at the first meeting of Oregon's advisory council on employment, February 3 in Salem.

Dr. Calvin Crumbaker, head of University of Oregon economics department and chairman of the committee, is preparing studies of programs for the council's consideration. These are aimed at easing of increasing seasonal unemployment and furthering development of the state's resources.

Speakers who will discuss the national, coastal and statewide aspects of the problem will include Gov. Douglas McKay, on council objective; T. Morris Dunne, chairman of state unemployment compensation commission and member of Interstate Conference Committee for Employment Development; Dewey Coates, representing bureau of employment security, U. S. department of labor; Glenn E. Brockway, BES regional representative; Silas Gaiser, SUCC administrator; Virgil L. Sexton, SUCC supervisor of research and statistics.

Council members are Jack Jennings and David Blakeman of Portland, Milan Smith of Pendleton, public members; M. E. Steele and George Brown of Portland, Mrs. Alice Bissell of Eugene, labor; J. C. Compton of McMinnville, Andrew Collier of Klamath Falls and Elmer R. Goudy of Portland, management.

Entertainment will be provided by Mary Park, vocal soloist, accompanied by Virginia Benner.

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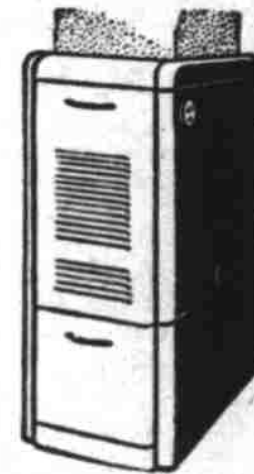
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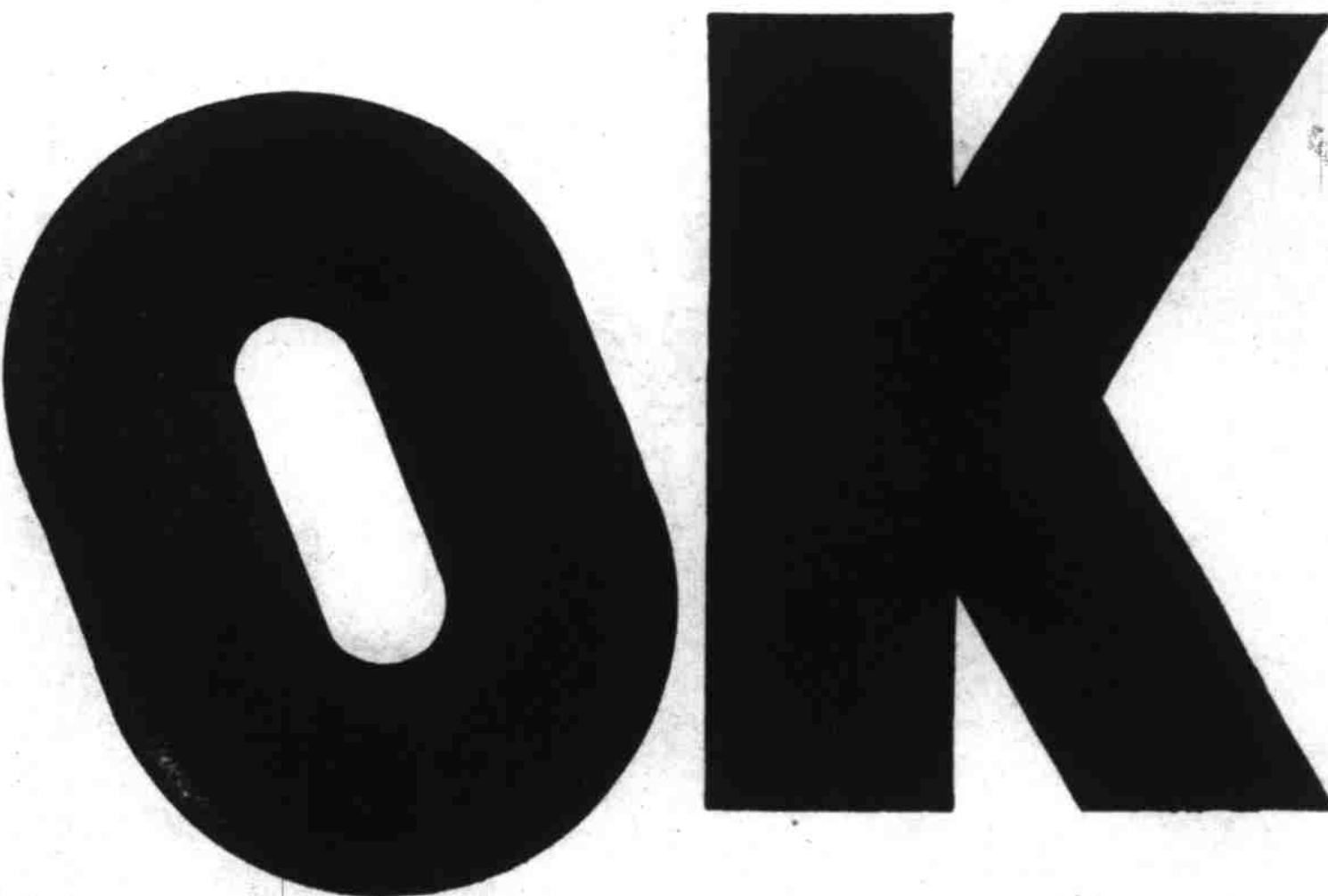
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
