## Shooting for No. 5 Vikings vs. Albany

Salem high's fast-rolling Vikings shot for their fifth straight Big Six league basketball victory tonight in an eight o'clock game at Albany with Bob Buchanan's Bulldogs. And inasmuch as the Bulldogs have been as winless as have the Vils been lossless, Coach Harold Hawk's racy crew should have Darryl Girod hitting trouble in handling the decision their own way. The Salmons also will be after win No. 11 for the season. They have dropped only three.

Hawk's starting lineup is expected to remain unchanged with Captain Darryl Girod and Larry Chamberlain as guards, Jim Rock at center and Doug Rogers and Wayne Walling as forwards. For the Vikings, the starters likely will be Bud Gibbs at center, who is the team's leading pointman with a 9.5 average to date, and Larry Helms, Dick Forster, Cub Sexton and Don Fleming in the other spots. At six-foot-two, Gibbs is tallest on the team. What with Walling, Rogers and Rock in the lineup, the Salmons will enjoy a decided advantage in height.

Another Big Sixer tonight will find Springfield at Corvallis. The Viking and Albany Valley teams will play a prelim to the varsity event at 7 p.m.

Having had our first peek at the Washington Huskies over the weekend in Seattle, we believe we now know just how come they are the surprising big wheels of the Northern Division basketball race, when in the beginning they were supposed to be little more than somebody else to step on. Coach Art McLarney has, to put it in the proverbial nutshell, a solid ball club capable of winning the championship. Five factors help make the Huskies solid: (1) loads of hustle, (2) good size, (3) individual talent, (4) youth and (5) capable reserves. The outfit has a fiery leader in chunky Louis Soriano, another good driver in Frank Guiness, whose play resembles that of Sammy White in a number of ways, a rugged worthy at center in Duane Enoch and three others who are capable of exploding for a potful of points in Captain LaDon Henson, Russ Parthemer and Hal Arnsborn. They all check well defensively, battle like demons for possession of the ball at all times and go about their chores systematically as well as with plenty of swift. No one player on the club is any more outstanding than the next, and any one of them is apt to be high point scorer for a game. Because of his all-over-the-point-and-in-your-hair style, Soriano is of course the fans' sweetheart. And those fans, incidentally, who for years were of divided opinion as to whether they should root for or against the Huskies in Seattle, are now one and all behind the team.

This isn't to be taken as an indication that Washington is impregnable or as a prediction that the 1950 pennant is to wave from Hec Edmundson's pavilion. It's merely a brief summary of what the so-called amazing Huskies have. Actually they aren't amazing at all. They're just a solid ball club.

Which brings up the question, "What's wrong with Oregon?" As we see it, nothing that a good big, rugged pivot man and a little luck couldn't cure but quickly. If John Warren had one more capable big man, and could keep from running into foes who seem to have their hottest nights of the season when they play Oregon, he would make it mighty rough for his opponents. The absence of that big man has hurt the Webfoots more than anything else. Even at that they're apt to heat up at any time without notice and polish off a favored opponent.
