

# Blues, Greys Tie for Lead

## W-Salem, Cards, Golds Lose Junior Games

Both Harry Mohr's Leslie Blues and Hank Landis' Parrish Greys today find themselves all tied up for the lead and looking forward to round No. 3 in the City Junior high basketball race, as a result of makeup games played Tuesday.

The Blues bounced the Leslie Golds handily, 43-19, in their mix at Leslie, and at the same time the Greys were downing West Salem, 31-18, and the Parrish Pioneers were noosing out the Cardinals in an overtime, 29-27. Maxim's manager, the colorful Jack (Doc) Kearns, announced immediately Joe would go after the heavyweight crown.

He said Maxim would remain in England to fight the winner of the Bruce Woodcock-Larry Savold but slated sometime in May. This is for the British version of the world heavyweight championship.

The U.S. National Boxing Association recognizes Ezzard Charles as the titleholder.

"They have just as much right to put on the world heavyweight championship here," Kearns said. "As the NBA has to call Ezzard Charles the world heavyweight champion."

Maxim, who weighed 174 1/2 to Mills' 173, was a favorite to win but his knockout finale was unexpected.

Bookmakers here had established the 27-year-old invader as a 1 to 2 favorite on the strength of his ring cunning. The 30-year-old champion was rated the heavier puncher and if any knocking-out was to be done, Mills was the one expected to do the job.

# Duquesne 2nd in AP Poll Holy Cross Quintet Retains Top Rating

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—Unbeaten Holy Cross came out on top today by a huge margin as the country's No. 1 basketball team in the fourth weekly Associated Press poll. The Crusaders, winners of 14 games, collected 118 out of a possible 166 first-place votes in capturing the first spot for the second straight time.

Sports writers and broadcasters from coast to coast named Duquesne for second place. The Pittsburgh Dukes, only other undefeated major five (13-0), received only four first-place nominations in jumping from last week's sixth spot. Long Island (13-2) stayed in third position, even though North Carolina State whipped the Brooklyn five last week.

Kentucky (11-4), loser of three of its last five starts, moved up a notch to fourth. Notre Dame handed Adolph Rupp his latest last night, 64-51. St. John's of Brooklyn (15-2), leader in the first two polls, fell from second to fifth. Bradley (15-3) finished sixth. The speedy Braves were upset by Detroit Saturday, a major factor in dropping them from fourth.

LaSalle of Philadelphia (11-2) climbed to seventh place from last week's 10th. City College of New York (9-2) dropped one notch to eighth. Continuing its downward descent, Indiana (12-2) also fell one rung, to ninth.

North Carolina (13-3) placed 10th, barely behind Indiana.

Other first-place ballots went to 11th-ranked U.C.L.A., four, 12th-place Kansas State, two, and 16th-spotted Washington, two.
