WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—Wash B. Williams, local sportsman and beer distributor, said tonight he was "mystified and bewildered" that his offer to pay \$550,000 cash for 40 per cent of the stock in the Washington Senators Baseball club had been rejected.

Williams told a reporter a firm of Philadelphia lawyers approached him indirectly last Saturday and said they were "interested" in disposing of the stock which was purchased about a month ago by John J. Jaehym of Jamestown, N.Y. "I told them Monday we were ready to go and would have the cash in 48 hours," Williams said. "We had tickets to go to Philadelphia today, but at the last minute they called it off."

Williams said he was chiefly interested in buying Jaehym's stock because of his friendship for Clark Griffith, president of the Washington Senators. "I knew there was a little discord between Griff and Jaehym, and I thought if I got in there would be harmony," Williams said.

The million dollar facility built in 1946 faces bankruptcy action by the First National Bank of Portland. The bank has asked a court here to throw the track into receivership.

C. G. Cunningham, Stockton, Calif., appeared here today and disclosed he represented a group of California businessmen who want a place to indulge in their harness racing hobby. He said running horses would also be raced—if it paid.
