Appetite Appeal

Starchy Baked Dishes Handy for Filling Up Family In from Outdoor Activities

Starchy foods, such as rice, noodles and macaroni are mighty filling for days when the family is actively engaged in outdoor sports or other exercise which stimulates appetites.

Here for example are three good dishes to add to the list of winter weather foods. All take cheese.

SPAGHETTI DE LUXE

2 cups spaghetti 1/4 cup mushrooms
1 tablespoon butter 1 No. 1 can tomato soup
1 onion, finely cut 2 cups American cheese,
1 green pepper, finely cut grated
1/4 cup stuffed olives, sliced

Cook spaghetti. Melt butter in pan, add onion, pepper, olives, mushrooms and soup; heat. Add cheese, stir until melted. Pour over spaghetti. Bake in buttered casserole in a moderate oven 350 degrees F. 30 minutes. Serves 8.

NOODLES ROMANOFF

1/2 cup noodles Dash Tabasco sauce or red
1 cup cottage cheese 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup sour cream 1/2 cup American cheese,
1/4 cup onion, finely chopped 1/2 cup grated
1 clove garlic, finely cut
2 teas. Worcestershire sauce

Cook noodles. Add cottage cheese, cream, onion, garlic, Worcestershire sauce, pepper and salt. Place in buttered baking dish (8-inch). Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Remove from oven, sprinkle with cheese, return to oven for 10 minutes. Serves 6.

RICE LOAF WITH MUSHROOM SAUCE

(Serves 6)
1 1/2 cups cooked rice 1 cup hot milk
1 1/2 cups American cheese, 1/2 teaspoon onion, chopped
grated 1/2 teaspoon parsley, chopped
1/4 cup butter, melted 1 teas. green pepper, minced
3 eggs, slightly beaten 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup bread crumbs
Combine and mix all ingredients. Put in a buttered loaf pan, set in hot water, bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1 hour. Serve with hot mushroom sauce.

MUSHROOM SAUCE

2 tablespoons butter 1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons flour 1/2 cup mushroom liquor
1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup canned mushrooms,
1/2 cup cream drained
Melt butter, add flour, stir until smooth paste. Add milk, cream, salt and liquor, stirring constantly. Add mushrooms.

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The Designing Woman

SO MUCH ROOM

Until someone invents stretchable walls, nothing can add more room to a room than sectional furniture. Storage sectionals which build high, wide and handsomely use space that doesn't seem to be there when do-little furniture is scattered about. And all the pieces you need organize so well that the room looks bigger than it is, and more invitingly open and comfortable.

There are only eight pieces in one group, two door cabinets, two shelf units, two two-drawer chests and two three-drawer chests, all in ponderosa pine. But the possibilities for combining the pieces is greater than you can imagine until you try ideas of your own, and of course your own ideas mean limitless color because you finish or paint the furniture yourself.

It's all a matter of measuring wall space and then sketching combinations of pieces until you're set with a fit to the wall and to specific needs. The units come in 26-inch and 35-inch widths. All units are 24 1/4 inches

high except the two-drawer chests which are 17 inches high.

At left above is an arrangement using five drawer chests and two cabinets, a plan which stretches the usefulness of any room, a bedroom or a one-room apartment as well as a living room. At right is a five shelf unit, three cabinet and one chest unit combination that has break-front-like importance. Try your own hand at designing a wall that isn't in formal balance. An arrangement that builds high at one end and stays low at the other can be very smart. And see how interesting and useful you can make a combination of three, four or five pieces.

You'll have to wait a month or two before this furniture will arrive in the stores, but in the meantime you can design and redesign until you know just what you want.

The Democratic women of Polk county, hope to increase the number of registered voters by conducting a house-to-house campaign the past week under the leadership of Mrs. Orland J. Those eligible to register must be 21 years of age, residents in Oregon six months and in the precinct thirty days. Registration can be made by appearing before the county clerk, Mrs. Edna M.
