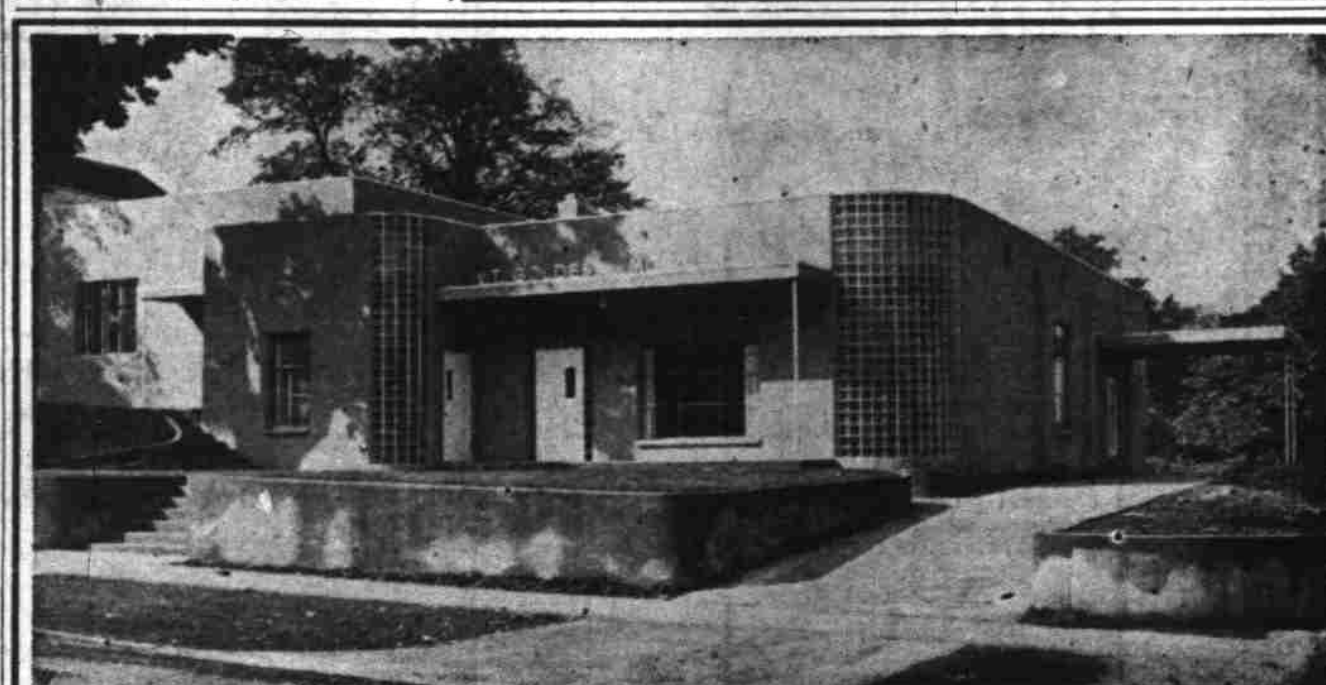

Dairymen Advised to Educate Public on Food Value of Milk

KEIZER, Jan. 28 - That the dairy people are sitting in the lap of the world because 76 per cent of the calcium consumed in the nation and 14 per cent of the energy food comes from milk, Dr. G. A. Richardson of Oregon State college, told his listeners at the annual meeting of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club held here today.

Dr. Richardson urged the dairy people to educate the consumer in the value of milk, encourage consumers to buy higher food-value milk and that the dairymen himself place a top-grade product on the doorstep of the consumer. He pointed out by actual mathematical analysis that if a quart of 3.2 per cent butterfat content milk is worth 17 cents to the consumer, a quart of 5.5 milk is worth 24 cents in nutrient energy received. The consuming public, Richardson said, had never been taught properly the actual food values in milk. Eventually, he believed, producers would be paid upon the basis of value in the milk.

Lutheran Sects Reach Accord On Doctrine

Announcement of a doctrinal agreement looking toward possible unification of the American Lutheran church and the Lutheran church, Missouri Synod, was received in Salem Saturday by pastors of the churches representing the groups. The agreement reached by official committees will be presented to both national conventions this year for ratification.

The American church has a membership of 689,310, including baptized children. The Missouri synod has 1,680,000 members. Together they comprise more than one-third of American Lutheranism, officials said. The congregations here are St. John's Lutheran of Missouri synod, 16th and A streets, the Rev. H. W. Gross, pastor; and Christ Lutheran, 18th and State streets, the Rev. C. R. Schulz, pastor.

The document of agreement states that "this common confession of faith is the composite work of the committee on doctrinal unity of the Lutheran church, Missouri Synod, authorized and empowered to prepare such a statement by its 1947 convention, and of the committee on fellowship of the American Lutheran church, authorized and empowered to negotiate by its 1948 convention."

The document formulated by the two committees, couched in language designed to be understood by laymen, contains a comprehensive statement of Lutheran Christian teaching. Throughout, the authority of the Scriptures is emphasized as the only source of Christian teaching.

Further discussions on the practical outcomes of the new agreement will follow the conventions in the fall of 1950.
