First Aid

Scientists Study Possibilities of Vegetable Canning, Less Cooking

Scientists have not forgotten the housewife. All this business of new discoveries in medicine and other sciences will in the end aid in the general duties of the woman who works at home.

Saving human lives by antibiotics such as penicillin and aureomycin is a familiar story today. But the possibility of saving food by the use of antibiotics in canning, for example, is new and may in the future revolutionize commercial canning or other food preserving methods. The first results of research on canning with antibiotics have been reported recently by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Agricultural and Industrial Chemistry.

Canners have long been searching for some way to sterilize vegetables without high heat. Antibiotics may be the answer. In studies at the Western Regional Research Laboratory, Albany, Calif., canned vegetables were sterilized by adding minute quantities of an antibiotic and then giving the sealed cans a relatively mild heat treatment. (The mild heat is needed to kill yeast or other enzymes in the vegetables).

This method proved as effective for destroying food spoilage organisms in the vegetables tested as conventional canning methods. Very much better flavor was reported for some of the canned vegetables. More rapid canning at lower temperatures was possible and pressure-cooking equipment was not needed for sterilizing.

In most of the tests the antibiotic used was subtilin, a protein-like substance given off by a common, harmless type of bacteria which normally exists in many food products. Limited tests were made also with aureomycin, chloromycetin and luptol — the last, an antibiotic recently isolated from hops at the laboratory. These substances as used did not affect the flavor of the canned vegetable.

The process is still in the very early stage of experiment. Several years probably will be necessary before the scientists know whether canning this way is safe and practical. Long, careful investigation also will be necessary to make sure that the antibiotics used have no harmful effects.

Patent Leather Shoes Head Fashions For Spring. Good Finish. New Colors

Are you one who yearns for patent leather slippers at the first sign of spring? You can indulge in them — and ever so many other patent accessories — today!

— to your heart's content this season. The shiny finish is headed for No. 1 fashion importance in spring accessories — and it's a lot more durable than it used to be.

Patent leather will delight you with its lovely colors — especially soft pastels. There's an iridescent touch added to some colors, notably a new gray tone, that is very effective in footwear. Of course bags are being brought out to match the slippers. You also will find it much used for hats — the entire

hat as well as a trimming, for touches on dresses, and as turn-back cuffs and other ornamentation on gloves.

This new patent finish, which now comes from synthetics, has considerable flexibility, and therefore is not subject to the cracking of the old type. To clean it, wipe with a damp cloth, then buff with a soft clean cloth a bit when the surface is thoroughly dry. Do not put an oil on it, for this will dull the shiny finish.

Of course, the patent finish on leather seals it and makes it practically airtight. This is the reason that patent leather footwear has the reputation of being hot. Today's styles that feature open toes and heels and latticework straps, offer no such problem. You'll find, too, that many of closed pumps have cut-out designs to give ventilation. Another popular device is all-over perforation, which is ornamental as well as practical.

Queen Elizabeth's Shoe Among Those Displayed at Bank

That Britain's mighty Queen Elizabeth also had mighty tiny feet — or else was quite vain — is proved by a display of old shoes now in the showcase at Salem branch of First National Bank of Portland.

Star of the group is a size 2 shoe worn about 400 years ago by the queen of Shakespeare's day. It is owned by Mrs. Irene Stupfel of Salem, whose family records show that an ancestor was one of Elizabeth's maids-in-waiting. The other of the pair is owned by a sister in California.

The tiny slipper is hand-made of morocco leather, with embroidery on Irish linen and Chinese silk. It was reportedly brought overland from China to England.
