With traffic at a minimum the quietness was felt more each day as the storm progressed. With school closed for several days even the snow-man fever subsided.

There have been no major tragedies in Four Corners as a result of the storm unless one could class stalled cars and frozen water pipes in that category. The mail was delivered just about on schedule. The paper boys, failing to persuade dad to help out with the family car (except on the very worst days), slugged along on foot when the bike couldn't make it, delivering the indispensable newspaper each day.
