Non-Farm Work Shows Decline; Some Fields Up

Non-agricultural employment dropped only 1.2 per cent in Oregon from November to December of 1949, the state unemployment compensation commission announced Tuesday.

The 416,200 non-farm jobs listed as of December 15 represented a decline of only one per cent from the same period in 1948. Major declines in construction and food processing were partially offset by holiday hiring in retail trade and post offices.

A gain of 1,400 was reported over 1948 in manufacturing employment because of favorable conditions in lumber and wood products which reported 5,900 more workers than during the previous year.

Income Taxes Decline Noted In Past Year

State income tax collections dropped 12 per cent in 1949 from the record \$59,203,646 collected in 1948, the state tax commission reported Tuesday. The 1949 total was \$52,111,792.

Officials said the decrease resulted because the withholding tax went into effect in 1948 and that many taxpayers paid two years taxes in the one year.

Actually, allowing for withholding collections, the 1949 total would be greater, probably by about \$2,000,000, than the 1948 record, officials said.

Individuals paid \$32,927,907.01 or 63 per cent of the 1949 collections. Corporations paid \$19,183,885, about 1.5 per cent less than in 1948.

Personal income tax returns filed during 1949 upon which refunds were claimed totaled 200,762. Of this total 136,554 were taxable returns, 49,945 were nontaxable, and 14,863 had preaudit adjustments which reclassified them as having a tax due instead of a refund.

Of 185,899 returns on which refunds actually were due, the commission, by December 31, 1949, had issued \$17,690 refund checks aggregating \$1,823,769.

For the calendar year 1949 income tax returns filed amounted to 505,538, a decrease of 83,249 from 1948. Taxable individual returns filed in 1949 decreased from 520,342 in 1948 to 389,811. This decrease was attributed to the new form of the individual income tax return which permitted married persons filing separate returns to file on one form, and on the increase in personal exemptions allowed taxpayers on 1948 incomes.

Nontaxable individual returns filed increased from 44,734 in 1948 to 51,941 in 1949. This increase is a direct result of the withholding tax provisions of the income tax law which require filing of a return by individuals not otherwise required to file if they wish to have state tax withheld from their wages refunded to them.

Dental Survey to Start Soon For Salem School Children

A dental survey of Salem school children soon will be made by the Marion county health department in conjunction with the Marion-Polk-Yamhill Dental society.

The primary teeth are the first set of teeth that a child develops. They are also known as the deciduous teeth. Normally, a child has 20 primary teeth.

When do the primary teeth appear? Generally, the first primary tooth erupts when the child is about six months old and the set usually is complete at the age of two years. There is considerable variation in eruption time, however, especially in the age at which the first tooth appears. Some children have the first tooth as early as three months and in rare instances a baby is born with one or more teeth. On the other hand, some children reach the age of one year before the first tooth erupts.

Since the primary teeth are lost in time it is necessary to take care of them? Yes. Care of the primary teeth is exceedingly important to later dental health. Moreover, since the child uses the primary teeth for about the first 13 years—or approximately one-fifth of his normal lifetime—it is most important that they be maintained in the healthiest possible condition so that they can efficiently perform their job of chewing food.

The parents were here with their son when he died at 2:30 p.m.

Death Claims Pioneer Scion Frank Zumwalt

Frank Zumwalt, 82, son of an early Oregon pioneer family and father of Chester Zumwalt of Salem, died here Tuesday morning.

The deceased was born on the family farm near Perrydale on March 28, 1868. His parents came to Oregon in 1845. Zumwalt farmed in that area for a number of years and moved to Salem in 1945.

In addition to his son he is survived by granddaughters, Barbara and Mary Lou Zumwalt of Salem; by a stepson, Clay C. Carson of Albany; and by several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held Friday, February 3, at the Henkle-Bollman funeral chapel at Dallas. Interment will take place at the family plot in Bethel cemetery.

City Building Permits Top Mark of 1949

Salem's building permit total for January was \$405,894.

A \$300,000 permit issued to Robert T. Coates of Portland for the controversial apartment house project at 555 S. Summer st. was the principal item.

Ten permits for new houses and one for a duplex accounted for another \$79,000.

Construction volume in January, 1949, totaled \$256,466. Permits for 19 new dwellings were issued during that period.

P. S. Freisen obtained a permit Tuesday for a house and garage at 1195 N. 23rd st. Cost was estimated at \$7,500.

Jones Victor In Suit Over Labish Land

A two-year court battle between a group of Japanese celery growers and Ronald Jones, Lake Labish farmer, ended Tuesday when Marion Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell ruled in favor of Jones.

Hiroshi Kaneko, representing the members of the Lake Labish Celery Growers cooperative who were evacuated under wartime security measures in 1942, had asked \$30,000 judgment against Jones.

Kaneko alleged that Jones, who leased lands to the Japanese, had been rightfully paid \$30,000 that belonged to the plaintiffs.

Kimmell, however, ruled that Jones was entitled to the \$30,050 as payment for his services in supervising the 1942 harvest and as compensation for not raising rents from 1942 to 1946 when land values doubled.

Kimmell also ruled that the Japanese had been paid \$17,574 more than they deserved. This amount represents one-half the total bonuses paid to workers by Jones in 1942.

Under the 1942 agreement, Jones was to receive one-half the profits from the lands formerly worked by the plaintiffs on condition that he assume full control of harvesting the crops. Profits in 1942 totaled \$172,518. One-half of this total was paid to the co-op members who planted the crops. The other half was awarded to the cooperative which harvested them. Bonuses were paid to the workers out of the cooperative's half.

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
