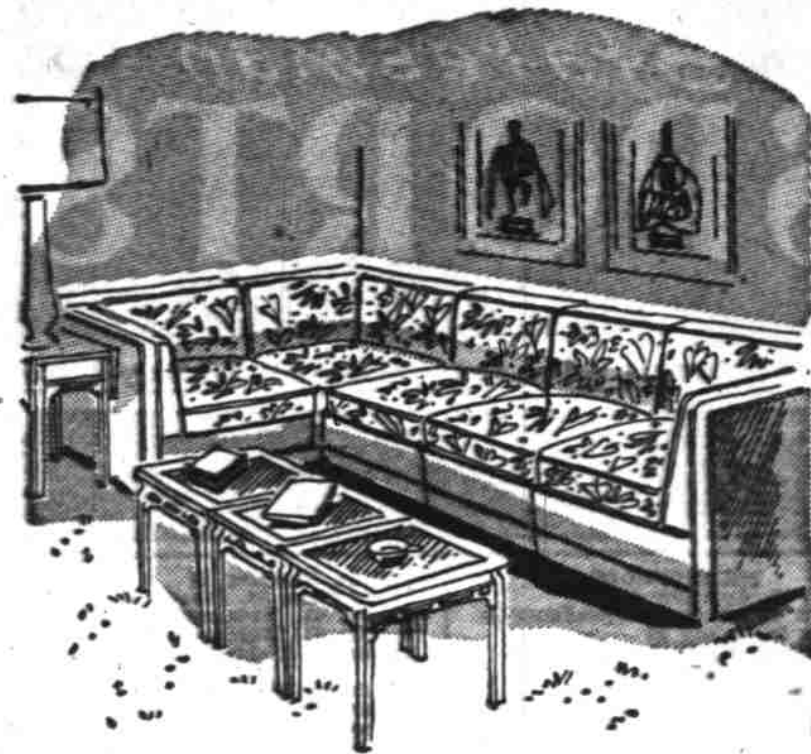

Salmon Makes Main Dishes, Salads For Winter Menus; Best Listed

Though fresh salmon is one of the big treats offered westerners, the canned variety is a mighty popular fish too.

The salmon is good as a luncheon snack, when included in salads or sandwiches, and makes a main dish too.

For a hot winter luncheon dish, serve creamed salmon in a nest of flaky rice. A can of mushrooms added to the creamed salmon will give extra flavor, or canned or frozen peas will give color.

Potatoes, baked, scooped out and combined with a rather thick creamed salmon mixture and put back into the shells is a good main dish for the family's supper.

Scalloped salmon, salmon loaf, and salmon croquettes are to be found in most cookbooks, and remain popular with many families.

Canned salmon, combined with seasonings, parsley, cracker crumbs and with an egg to moisten can be a good breakfast dish when made into cutlets and fried, or becomes a dinner dish when served with creamed vegetables or mushrooms.

Here are several other recipes from the canners, using the fish:

FRENCH-TOASTED SALMON SANDWICHES
1 8-oz. can salmon, flaked
2 stalks celery, chopped
6 sweet pickles, chopped
¼ cup mayonnaise
1 egg, beaten
¼ cup milk
Salt and pepper
¼ cup butter
8 slices bread

Mix salmon, celery, pickles and mayonnaise. Spread mixture on 8 slices bread. Cover with other slices. Tie sandwich with string. Mix egg with milk; season with salt and pepper. Melt butter in large skillet. When hot, fry sandwiches 2 minutes on each side, or until golden brown. Cut string. Serve hot. Serves four.

SALMON SOUFFLE
2½ cups salmon
Juice of half a lemon
1½ tablespoons butter
1½ tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
4 egg yolks, beaten
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup bread crumbs
4 egg whites, beaten

Flake salmon and sprinkle with lemon juice. Melt butter and blend in flour. Add milk, then beaten egg yolks and salt. Stir in salmon and bread crumbs. Fold in beaten egg whites. Place in pan set in hot water. Bake 40 minutes in moderate oven (350 degrees). Garnish with lemon wedges and parsley.

Flaxmen to Get Little Federal Aid—Cochran

Not much help from Washington, D. C. can be looked for in disposing of the current flax crop, Clay Cochran, manager of Salem's Chamber of Commerce, indicated Tuesday when Willamette Valley flax plant directors and officers met at the Salem chamber rooms.

Cochran reported on his recent trip to the nation's capital in the interest of the Oregon Flax industry.

Approximately 20 flaxmen attended the meeting to hear Cochran's report. Represented were plants from Molalla, Canby, Mt. Angel and Jefferson, as well as members of the newly appointed flax board headed by Henry R. Crawford.

Plant operators had hoped for a subsidy or some other means of substantial assistance in disposing of the crop. The outlook for such help was not very encouraging, Cochran stated.

However, the flax industry representatives decided to go ahead on their own and work toward establishing a more uniform front in flax production.

A committee was appointed to confer with the state flax men on establishing uniform grades to be obtained largely through uniform growing methods. To serve on the committee are Fred Schwab of Molalla and Walter Shelby of the Santiam Flax plant near Jefferson.

"We have to establish our own industry on a better footing," Crawford stated. He indicated, however, that "things were looking up a bit" in the industry in as much as the flax plant managers were now working more closely together. Studies of better marketing methods are also being made.

"But first," Crawford stated, "we have to produce a very good product. We even have to learn what is a very good product on the world's market."

The committee will report back to the general group early next month, Crawford stated. He and Mrs. Crawford are leaving for a month in Southern California but expect to be back so that he can meet with the group in early March.

Speaker Tells Of Spiritual Healing Work

Ralph Castle C. S. of San Francisco spoke to a large audience in the Elsinore Theatre yesterday on "Christian Science; Its Reinstatement of Primitive Christianity and Spiritual Healing."

"Properly to present this discussion," the speaker said, "we should recall an incident which occurred in 1879, when a group of 26 persons, members of what was known as the Christian Science Association, met with their Leader, Mary Baker Eddy, to consider the formation of a church, the purpose of which was to forward the understanding and demonstration of Christian Science."

"A motion made by Mrs. Eddy, and duly carried, resulted in the founding of The First Church of Christ, Scientist. The motion read as follows: 'To organize a church designed to commemorate the word and works of our Master, which should reinstate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing' (Church Manual, p. 17)."

"There is no period after the word 'Master.' It does not read, 'To organize a church designed to commemorate the word and works of our Master.' We might say that all Christian denominations right-

ly claim that as their intention. Mrs. Eddy went much farther. She stated the form in which the commemoration should be made: namely, that this church 'should reinstate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing.'"

"Let me tell you a story of a deeply religious Christian woman whose daughter, her only child, lay dying. Some time previously she had lost her sight. One day a friend asked the mother if she had ever considered trying Christian Science. Despite the strong convictions of her own denomination, this mother consented to ask for help in Christian Science."

"A Christian Science practitioner was called on the telephone, but was obliged to say she could not visit them until the next day. The practitioner did consent to work for the daughter—that is, to give absent Christian Science treatment—and told the mother to hold to the thought that life is eternal. Within a few hours the daughter's condition improved."

"She opened her eyes and found her sight had been restored. She then asked to be given some milk, all to the consternation of a nurse who had been in attendance and who could not grasp what had happened. The patient began to eat normally, and when the doctor, who had not been informed of what had taken place, made his customary visit, he could only regard the healing as a miracle."
