

Pendleton Men Charged with Holdup at Bar

PENDLETON, Feb. 9—(P)—Two Pendleton men were charged today with robbing the Rainbow bar of \$2,400 after herding the occupants into a rest room at pistol point.

Douglas Hope Marshall, 22, and Lester Lee Thompson, 29, were arrested less than three hours after the midnight robbery of the tavern.

A passerby, who saw a man race out of the bar carrying a cashbox and jump into a car, tipped off police as to the car's license number.

Police went to Thompson's home and made the arrest. They recovered all \$2,400.

Police Chief Charles Lemons said both men signed statements admitting the robbery. He said Thompson drove around the block, while Marshall, his face handkerchief-covered, entered the car, ordered the bartender, a customer, and janitor into a rest room, and took the cash box.

Jap Fish Fleet to Stay Away from Pacific Coast Area

VANCOUVER, Feb. 9—(CP)—The pre-war poison for Pacific coast fishermen—the Japanese fishing fleet—will never be back.

Fisheries Minister R. W. Mayhew, back from Japan, said in an interview today the Japanese fleet does not want to come back to the Pacific coast.

"They realize it is too far from their homeland. But, they do want permission to fish in the waters south of Japan."

"The Japanese get 80 per cent of their protein from the sea, and it will always be that way. More than 4,000,000 people and 450,000 boats are engaged in the industry there, making Japan the world's number one fish producer."

Old Country "FLOAT DOH" HUNGARIAN WATER ROLLS

HUNGARIAN WATER ROLLS (KIPFEL) Adapted by Mary Mills
Besides 4 1/2 cups FISHER'S BLEND FLOUR, sifted and measured—you'll need:
1 1/2 cakes yeast
2 T. sugar
1/2 cup cool water
1 1/2 t. salt
1/2 cup sweet butter
1 cup rich top milk
4 egg yolks
2 t. vanilla
1/2 t. lemon extract
2 T. cinnamon

Here is Mary Mills' modern version of a treasured recipe. Mix sugar, yeast and water. Let stand until light and fluffy. Rub butter, flour and salt together until crumbly. Beat eggs well until smooth. It will be a VERY SOFT DOUGH. Do not knead. Dip clean flour sack in water. Wring dry. Lay it flat on table. Dust with flour. Put dough in center; bring corners of sack up and tie loosely. Leave room for dough to expand. Fill a container with about 3 quarts of lukewarm water. Drop dough in carefully. Set aside to rise. It will float when ready. Lift dough out of water. Turn it into bowl. In another bowl, have 3/4 cup sugar and 2 T. cinnamon well mixed. Take dough about size of an egg and press it flat in sugar mixture. Twist dough once or twice to make a roll, weiner size. Shape into horseshoe and lay carefully in well-buttered pan about 1 inch apart. This will make 25 rolls. Sprinkle remaining sugar over tops. Set aside in warm place to rise, about 1 hour, or until double in size. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes or until nicely browned.
